PARIS (AP)—The shimmer of soft starlight is appearing in fashion's picture of spring playtime clothes. Black sequins evening gowns with the frosty sparkle of a starlight night, gleaming silver gauze evening wraps over colorful tulle frocks, black organizes splashed with silver dots and little wraps of shaggy shimmering sequins fringe are among the most brilliant notes.

The same shimmering effect appears in evening accessories. Diamond stars, sparkles from smooth cutlures of night, silver star buttons fasten dark evening tailcoats, and silver plaques Egyptian necklaces accompany both afternoon and dinner clothes.

The "starlight" embroidered touches are among the most striking in the mode. A black net dancing frock is embroidered with black sequins stars, a black organza is stitched in silver stars and a pale blue rousin tea gown has wide sleeves trimmed with "young" silver moons.

Silver gauzes, sequins and laces make other striking ensembles. One designer shows a long bishop-sleeved wrap of fine silver gauze over a flowered tulle frock, another, makes an evening, tailcoat combining a jacket and ankle-length skirt of silver lame worn with a black satin blouse and a number of others show evening capes of shining silver sequins.

The afternoon mode also reflects a silver touch. One gown of black crepe de chine is caught at the neckline with a silver mirror brooch. Another has a round neckline and tight cuffs embroidered in silver nail-head sunray effect and is worn with a silver nail-head belt.

Frocks of silvery gray satin or crepe and chosen by some smart Parisians for the cocktail hour, while others wear black tulle frocks with silver threads.

Accessories in silver effects accompany some of the frocks. One chic American wears two gleaming silver ball earrings and a silver globe ring with a black crepe frock. She carries a black antelope bag fastened with a silver ball.

Black Is Combined With Pale Costumes

VENICE (AP)—Princess Edmond de Polignac, of Paris, who is spending some time in Italy, combines black with pale yellow or white in striking costumes this spring. With a black wool frock she wears either a pale yellow, angora wool, three-quarter length coat or knee-length wrap of white tulle lined with black wool crepe.

Removing Stains

WASHINGTON CREW WINS FROM BEARS

SEATTLE, Apr. 14 (AP)—The famous racing crews of Washington and California stood ready today to challenge the prospective participants in the national intercollegiate regatta at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 16, following their mighty battle on Lake Washington here yesterday when the northern Huskies successfully defended their Pacific coast rowing championship by the narrow margin of some 12 feet or a quarter-boath length.

The veteran national sprint titlists and coast champions of Washington and the powerful young sophomores of California were set to go east when and if their superiors say the word and raise the expense money.

A crowd variously estimated at between 60,000 and 80,000 persons witnessed one of the most thrilling races on Lake Washington when the Huskies nosed out the Bears in a last minute super-human drive. It was a heart-breaking battle for the Californians after driving bow-and-arrow down the long three-mile course.

As expected California won the three-mile junior-varsity contest, but it was by the unlooked for margin of nine lengths. Washington surprised the southerners by trimming the Bear freshmen by four and one-half lengths in the two-mile sprint.
