is conducted has also called for many complimentary remarks. The elimination of the contest idea has met with universal approval. That removal has brought this great body of about 350 to 400 together to sing for the love of singing; has placed the small school with its more limited resources on the level with the school of large enrollment and consequent greater resources.

The program was given as previously published with the exception of the two entrants from the Athena High school. An epidemic of small pox in that town with as high as a dozen quarantines in one day — it was reported Saturday — made it impossible for their numbers to be presented. Two bands were presented: the Pendleton band of around 50 boys and girls, appeared in white trousers and white shirts open at the throat; the Baker band in their regular uniforms of white with purple and gold caps. There were three orchestras, La Grande, Adams and North Powder; two mixed choruses, Pendleton and Baker; one glee club, consisting: two piano solos, Enterprise and Adams; one soprano solo, Union; two baritone solos, Lettine and Wallawa; one alto, Imbler; one girl trio, Wallawa (the only group during the day obliged to respond to an encore); and McLaughlin Hi; two girls sextets, Imbler and Ontario; girls triple trio, Enterprise; girls glee clubs, Union and Ontario; La Grande a cappella choir and the great massed chorus.

The next tournament to be sponsored by the Eastern Oregon Normal school will be the "speech art" Saturday April 28.
