

## SAYS FAMILIES OF C. C. C. BOYS NOT 'ON COUNTY'

The following communication relative to the C. C. C. boys, received by the Observer this week, is of general interest:

Dear Sirs: I wish to write you regarding an article published in the Observer relative to young men going to C. C. C. camps from Union county, "taking them from county assistance." Last November when a contingent left, the paper said: "Taking certain number of county's care."

I happen to know several of these families and know that they are self-respecting, energetic people who have not been on county care. Several are active in church, P. T. A. or relief work, doing all they can to help one another and others during these times of distress.

These fine young men, rather than loaf and live off charity have volunteered to go to these camps and help make it possible for their families to remain self supporting and self respecting. They are giving honest labor in return for what U. S. gives to them.

Possibly this report came to you from officials and was given exact, or maybe, unthinking, you wrote it up there. But, suppose you were ill, lost money in the bank, was out of work, and your fine son, rather than see his family on charitable organizations, volunteered to fill in the gap? Would you want it said in your local paper that you were taken off relief or county care? Would you, he, or other members of your family, want to go to school, church, or other places and face people knowing they thought you were only county charges?

Please do not consider this as a criticism meant harshly or unkindly—merely a suggestion for in a few days more of our boys will be going. They will be boys who want to work, and keep families off public care, and who respect the ones who cared for them, so let us be careful not to offend any who will give their best for their loved ones. ## BOTH PENDLETON AND MAC-HI HAVE TRACK STRENGTH

What will La Grande High school's track chances be in the quadrangular meet at Pendleton Saturday?

That question is being asked frequently this week, and all indications are that the Tigers' chances will not be exactly rosy. What Walla Walla has this year is unknown, but they are usually good for quite a bunch of points. But two track meets held over the Blue mountains last weekend—between Mac-Hi and Waitsburg, and the Pendleton class meet—indicates that the Pioneers and Bucks have plenty.

Here are some winning marks made by Mac-Hi, the Bucks and the Tigers in weekend meets and practice meets:

100-yard dash: Search, Pendleton, 10.6; Williams, Mac-Hi, ran second to Butler, Waitsburg, who turned in 10.3; Irwin, La Grande, 11.2.  
Discuss: Cole, Mac-Hi, 101 feet 8 inches; Gilchrist, Pendleton, 105 feet 2 inches; Zivkovich, La Grande, 95 feet 8 inches.

1 mile: Cole, Mac-Hi, 5:10.6; Snyder, Pendleton, 5:29 (mile 100 feet short).  
High jump: Davis, Mac-Hi, 5 feet 6 inches; Graybeal, Pendleton, 5 feet 5 1/2 inches; Hogenson, La Grande, 5 feet 9 inches.

Shotput: Knigh, Mac-Hi, was second to Buraker, Waitsburg, threw 40 feet 2 1/2 inches; Gilchrist, Pendleton, 41 feet 6 inches; Peterson, La Grande, 38 feet.  
220-yard dash: Isaac, Pendleton, 24.8; Both Mac-Hi and La Grande runners were second, Waitsburg time 23.2. Union time 25 flat.  
120-yard high hurdles: Langley, Mac-Hi, 17.9; McCormach, Pendleton, 17 flat. Full length race not run here.

Quarter mile: Davis, Mac-Hi, 55 seconds; McLaughlin, Pendleton, 56.1; Sullivan, La Grande, 59 3-5 seconds.  
Javelin: Gilchrist, Pendleton, 145 feet 8 inches; Mac-Hi man third to Waitsburg winner of 138 feet 8 inches; Walden, La Grande, 141 feet 6 inches.  
Broad jump: Davis, Mac-Hi, second to Waitsburg jump of 20 feet 7 inches; Graybeal, Pendleton, 20 feet 1 inch; Stitt, La Grande, 19 feet 1 inch.

220-yard low hurdles: Williams, Mac-Hi, 27.8; Galloway, Pendleton, 27.6; full length not run here.  
Half mile: Sims, Mac-Hi, 2:59.6; Snyder, Pendleton, 2:11.6; Hogenson, La Grande, no time taken.  
Pole vault: Langley and Leonard, Mac-Hi, both 10 feet 4 inches; Witty, Pendleton, 9 feet 5 inches; Stitt and Snyder, La Grande, 9 feet 6 inches.  
No times were given in the Pendleton relay, Waitsburg beat Mac-Hi in 1:41, and La Grande's time was 1:37 but the distance was 100 feet short.

## EXPECT U. S. APPROVAL OF SCHOOL HERE

Applications for the money were signed here yesterday by members of the board of education and Chancellor W. J. Kerr and were taken to Salem for the signatures of members of the board of control before being forwarded to Washington, D. C., where favorable action is anticipated. Chancellor Kerr said in Portland today there is every assurance that approval will be given such construction as a federal project.

The building was originally scheduled as a unit in the state building program. The legislature appropriated \$50,000 and the La Grande school district agreed to issue \$80,000 in bonds toward such construction. The bonds to be issued against a federal loan. A 30 per cent federal grant is anticipated.

The public works administration did not approve an application by the state for a \$50,000 loan for the La Grande building, rejecting the application on the question whether the state has the right to so borrow

and guarantee repayment. Therefore, the project was transferred from the PWA classification and the application was renewed under FERA provisions, with assurance the money would be available if the La Grande school district met all requirements, which has been done.
