EUGENE, Apr. 19 (AP) — Andersen Peter Jensen, 95, was burned to death when his small house this side of Junction City was destroyed by fire early this morning.

The blaze was discovered by his son, James Andersen, who lives close by, but it had gained such headway the son was unable to enter the house. In his attempts to rescue his father he was severely burned on the hands and about the face.

OREGON IN WARM WAVE
PORTLAND, Apr. 19 (AP) — Wednesday brought some new heat records for the season to Oregon as fair weather and temperatures above normal continued. The same conditions were to prevail today.

Umatilla had a maximum of 92 degrees. It was 88 at Wolf Creek; Roseburg and Medford had 86 degrees; the Portland and Eugene maximum was 86; Salem and Albany had 81; Baker had a 78-degree reading, and it was 68 at Marshfield.

C. E. CONVENTION OPENS
SALEM, Apr. 19 (AP) — The opening of the state Christian Endeavor convention in Salem tonight finds the general convention committee faced with one big problem; that of housing the more than 1,000 out-of-town delegates expected to register this afternoon.
