

LA GRANDE THIRD IN 4-WAY TRACK MEET SATURDAY

The La Grande High school track and field squad, doped to win no better than third or fourth at the quadrangular meet at Pendleton Saturday, lived up to expectations. The Tigers finished third, barely nosing out Wa-Hi. Pendleton won with nearly twice as many points as La Grande, and Mac-Hi was an easy second.

The Tigers had to be content with only two first places. Hughes Irwin winning the 220-yard dash and Hogenenson taking the high jump. La Grande was shutout in several events.

Next Saturday a quadrangular track meet is to be held here, according to present plans with Pendleton, Mac-Hi, Baker and La Grande competing.

Only two meet records were broken, Gilchrist of Pendleton, throwing the shot 42 feet 4 inches, and Langley, McLaughlin high jumper, breaking his pole vault record to 10 feet 9 inches.

McCormack, Pendleton hurdler-sprinter, was high point man with 14 1/2 and Gilchrist, his teammate, was second with 13.

ANGELS, MISSIONS SET FAST PACE IN WEEK'S PLAY

A clean sweep over the weekend gave the Los Angeles champions the Oakland series 6 to 1 and a three week's record of 17 games won and 4 lost. Young Lou Garland shut out the Oaks with 6 hits, 4 to 0, Saturday, Millard Campbell coasted in to an easy 13 to 3 win behind his mates' clubbing in yesterday's opener, and reliable Pay Thomas made it three straight with 4-hit twirling in the short second game, 6 to 1.

The slugging Missions of San Francisco kept pace with the leaders during the week, sweeping the Saturday and Sunday games, 18 to 10, 11 to 2 and 9 to 1 and taking the series from Portland, 6 to 1. In those three weekend encounters the Reds collected a grand total of 38 runs and 53 hits.

The league's best pitching continued on display at San Francisco, with Tom Flynn blanking the Seals 4 to 0 Saturday and Lefty Hermann stopping the Sacramento Senators 2 to 1 in the only game played Sunday.

Winning Saturday at Seattle 8 to 6 and again in yesterday's opener 3 to 2, Hollywood captured its first series of the season, 4 to 3, and climbed into a sixth place tie with the Indians. Four hit tossing by Zahner and Craghead gave the Indians the final game of the series, 4 to 3.
