Trackmeet Here Saturday

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Home Economics Conference Here Over Weekend

The Home Economics conference was opened Friday with registration from four to six o'clock. A banquet was held at the La Grande hotel in the evening with a short program afterwards. Miss Elizabeth Mills presided over that meeting.

The meeting of the conference was opened Saturday morning by Miss Myers. The first number on the program for that day was the address of welcome by Superintendent Herbert Evans. He traced the steps through which Home Economics training in the school have gone to reach the present day importance.

Miss Myers called on the teachers from the high schools represented to give a report of the year's activities of their home economic clubs. Miss Chingden from Ontario told of the varied program to finance, advertise and provide recreational and social opportunities for the members of the club. Others giving reports were Miss M. Peterson of Pendleton, Miss Slopier of Union, Miss Kathryn Dittel of Milton-Freewater, and Miss Thompson of Baker.

Dr. Florence Blazier, head of the Home Economics Educational department of Oregon State college, was introduced by Miss Hattberg and talked on the vocational opportunities of Home Economics girls. She outlined briefly the courses offered in that field by the State college and urged the girls to plan for their vocation before they entered college rather than afterwards. She explained several of the vocations for which girls might fit themselves, emphasizing the advantages of positions in Home Economics. Miss Blazier pointed out the advantage of no competition with men and that girls while receiving training as a wage earner were at the same time becoming trained home makers. Some of the vocations in this field mentioned by Miss Blazier were journalism, as it is applied in departments of newspapers and magazines; home demonstration agents; hospital dieticians; social service; and room and cafeteria hostesses as well as the wide field of teaching in the secondary and higher educational schools. She laid stress upon the fact that college training was necessary to fill all these positions.

At the afternoon meeting, Mrs. Frances W. Jonasson gave a history of the Home Economics clubs in Oregon and the six aims and objectives of this organization. An interesting feature of the meeting was the exhibits set up by the various schools to illustrate the different phases of home economics. These exhibitions were discussed by Mrs. Jonasson and evaluated by those present.

A short skit contrasting two different kinds of home life was given by the Imbler delegation. The song selections, "Wagon Wheels" and "Sit-tin' on a Log," sung by Mr. Ray Williams, and accompanied by Mrs. Williams.

On Wednesday morning, April 18, the La Grande High School Student Body met in assembly. The high school band gave a recital of the three numbers that they played at the State Band Contest last week.

In addition to the performance of the band, Mr. Carlson, field representative of the National Field Cross, gave a brief lecture on the administering of first aid. Mr. Carlson demonstrated the proper ways to rescue drowning persons; also emphasizing the fact that people should always swim in pairs, i. e., no matter how good a swimmer you are, never go swimming alone. Mr. Carlson also demonstrated how to stop the flow of blood in case a person was seriously injured or cut in an accident. If you are present when an accident has occurred, don't bother the injured person unless you know how to administer first aid; also don't let anyone else rush in and take hold of the injured person unless they know how to administer first aid—it is better to wait until a doctor arrives on the scene of the accident or someone else who is qualified to administer first aid.
