HAMSTREET BACK TO WALLOWA SUN

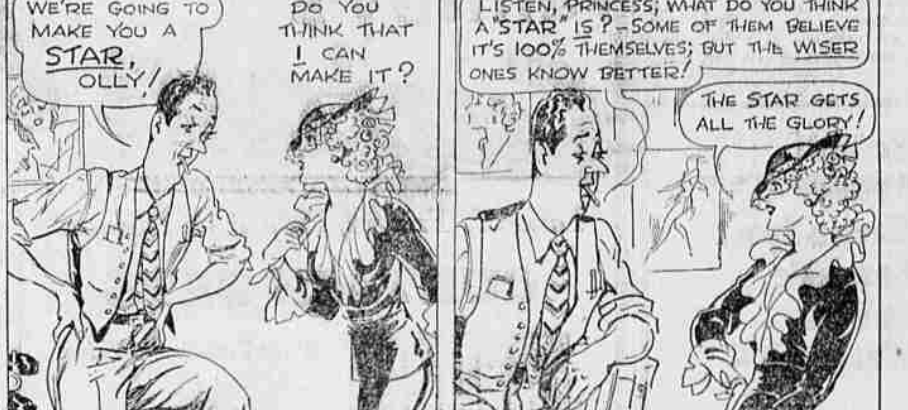

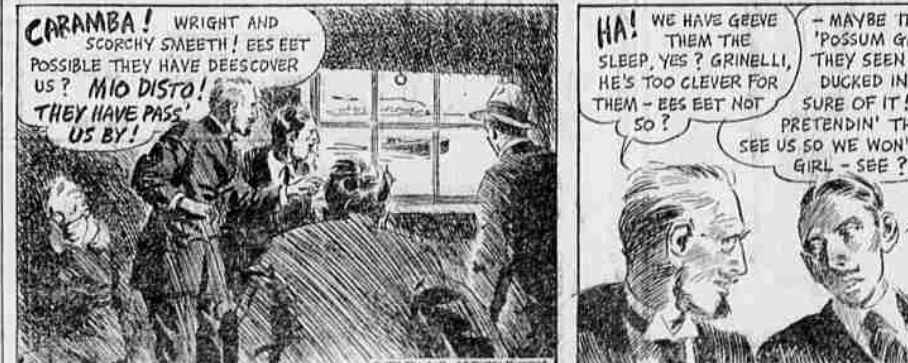
