Speeding automobiles were seen in Milwaukee, on the outskirts of Chicago, and in Port Wayne, Ind., but nowhere were the fugitives identified.

A midnight raid on an Elsworth, Wis., oil station by three men, who kidnapped the proprietor, intensified the search for Dillinger mobsters in the Twin City area.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 24 (AP)—George "Baby Face" Nelson, Chicago criminal, was definitely identified at the department of justice today as the Dillinger mobster who killed Special Agent W. Carter Baum in the gunplay in Wisconsin woods yesterday.

Responding to a request by President Roosevelt, the house judiciary committee today approved legislation to make it a federal offense for anyone to flee across state lines to escape apprehension or prosecution for crime.

President Roosevelt made the request yesterday after a federal agent had been killed in the hunt for John Dillinger, desperado.

It's Sacramento's turn this week to visit the Wrigley park home of the Angels and learn first hand why Manager Jack Leveille is so certain Los Angeles can't fail to win a second straight Coast league pennant.

Evidence to date is all in favor of Leveille. Los Angeles took five out of seven games from Portland, six out of seven from Hollywood and six out of seven from Oakland to draw three full games ahead of the Missions and five and one-half games ahead of the third-place San Francisco Seals.

Owner-Manager-Player Earl McNeely of Sacramento isn't as much afraid of the champions as the records suggest he should be. He figures the Senators, mainly because of the strength of their pitching corps and especially the effectiveness of Southpaw Tom Pynn and Lauri Vinici, are due to snap the Los Angeles winning streak this week.

Meanwhile the Missions expect an easy time at Seattle. The Reds have proven apt pupils to the teaching of Sargeant Gabby Street that the way to win ball games is to score a lot of runs and then to make some more for safety's sake. His San Franciscans crossed the home plate 80 times in seven games at Portland last week. Their series total of 100 hits lifted their team batting average to .325, 10 points above that of the Angels.

Completing this week's schedule, San Francisco entertains Oakland, and Portland makes a bid to climb out of the cellar at the expense of the well-battered Hollywood Stars at Portland.
