ROAD TO CHICAGO GOOD NOW, O. S. M. REPORT REVEALS

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special) — Ore-
gon motorists driving to Chicago's A
Century of Progress exposition which
opens for its second year May 26th
again will be able to travel virtually
the entire distance on oiled macadam
or pavement, according to an
announcement this week from the Ore-
gon State Motor association.

Except for short stretches of gravel-
led road in Wyoming and Western
Nebraska, motorists using U. S. high-
way No. 30 will find conditions ex-
cellent and may easily complete the
journey in nine days from Portland,
averaging about 260 miles daily, by
one of the two motorlogs suggested
by the association.

In a second suggested motorlog the
journey may be made in seven days,
averaging about 340 miles daily. On
neither main route is there danger of
missing, even when rains are en-
countered. Due to clemency of the
winter, even the detours will be fewer
and less formidable, according to the
association report.

The nine-day trip is outlined as
follows:

First day—Portland to Pendleton,
paved and oiled macadam, 231
mi.

Second day—Pendleton to Boise,
oiled macadam and pavement, 255 mi.

Third day—Boise to Pocatello, oiled
macadam and gravel, 270 mi.

Fourth day—Pocatello to Rock
Springs, pavement, gravel and oiled
macadam, 276 mi.

Fifth day—Rock Springs to Cheyenne,
oiled macadam and short dis-
tance of gravel, 293 mi.

Sixth day—Cheyenne to North
Platte, oiled macadam and gravel,
226 mi.

Seventh day—North Platte to Fremont,
gravel and pavement, 272 mi.

Eighth day—Fremont to Cedar
Rapids, paved, 328 mi.

Ninth day—Cedar Rapids to Chi-
cago, paved, 281 mi.

The seven-day trip suggested is as
follows:

First day—Portland to Baker, pave-
ment and oiled macadam, 338 mi.

Second day—Baker to Burley, pave-
ment and oiled macadam, 341 mi.

Third day—Burley to Rock Springs,
macadam, gravel and pavement, 362
mi.

Fourth day—Rock Springs to Sid-
ney, oiled macadam and gravel, 382
mi.

Fifth day—Sidney to Columbus,
gravel and pavement, 345 mi.

Sixth day—Columbus to Cedar Rap-
ids, pavement, 373 mi.

Seventh day—Cedar Rapids to Chi-
cago, pavement, 281 mi.
