COMPROMISE IS REACHED IN CAPITAL

failed. Joseph B. Eastman, federal coordinator of transportation, withdrew last Saturday as a mediator. Monday the managers and labor got together unexpectedly and worked out the compromise.

"We have joined in this agreement," said A. P. Whitney, chairman of the Railway Labor Executive association, "to comply with the wish of the president of the United States in the interest of national recovery."

The agreement runs for one year and to this extent will stabilize wages and American railroads and give all concerned a breathing spell. The following statement was issued by W. F. Thiehoff, chairman of the conference committee of managers:

"We faced the choice of reaching a settlement with employees or carrying the wage controversy to a conclusion under the law with its attendant uncertainty and disturbing effects. In the interest of stabilizing the railroad situation now, so as to promote the national recovery program, we chose the former choice. In so doing we have been mindful of the consideration of the national welfare pressed upon us by the president of the untiring efforts of the federal coordinator of transportation to compose the situation and of the forbearance of those who have represented the employees."

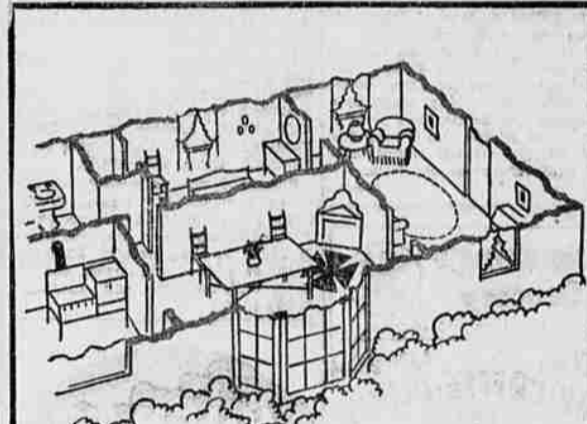
