

ANGELS SHOW NO LET-UP OF FAST PACE IN LEAGUE

Los Angeles walked off with the 1934 Coast League pennant, sold outfielder "Tut" Stainback to the Chicago Cubs and broke up the circuit's best pitching staff by sending Buck Newsom to the St. Louis Browns and Wyn Ballou and LeRoy Herrman to San Francisco.

Despite this, Manager Jack Leivelt has a 1934 pennant contender that is setting one of the fastest early season paces in the league's history.

Louis Garland shut out Sacramento with eight hits yesterday, 5 to 0, to boost the Angels' victory total to 19 against 4 defeats.

At Seattle Johnny Babich won his own game for the Missions by singling in the ninth and going home on Bud Hafe's single. Babich limited the Indians to 7 hits in hurrying the Reds to a 2 to 1 win.

San Francisco made it two straight over Oakland, 9 to 0, as Sad Sam Gibson pitched a masterful 4-hit game, striking out nine of the opposing batters.

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special) — The same 18-man track team which last Saturday turned back Walla Walla, La Grande and Mac-Hi in a quadrangular track and field meet on the Round-Up field will go to La Grande this Saturday to compete against teams from Baker, Milton and La Grande in the second quadrangular meet of the season. Each of the Buckaroos who won points in the meet last week will make the trip and several younger athletes who are expected to be point winners next season.
