Explain Purpose Of P. T. A. Health Round-Up

to be held on Monday, April 30, at several specified clinics in La Grande. The ultimate goal is to educate parents to the needs for early periodic examinations of their children by the family physician and dentist in order to insure correction of hampering defects which may not otherwise be discovered until the child enters school, it is said. Until parents become fully educated to the responsibility of the health of their children, the Summer Round-up will be necessary.

The places for the Round-up have already been announced, and members of the committee are anxious that as many of the children as possible, be brought to the respective headquarters for examination.

Dr. Clarence Gilstrap and Dr. W. K. Rose, county physicians are being assisted by the other doctors of the city in this important project. In the dental examinations members of the La Grande Dental association are contributing their services in making the examinations possible.

Among the defects common in young children are the diseases of the nose and throat, tonsils and adenoids. Diseased tonsils and adenoids should be removed as soon as discovered and careful watching for danger signals such as mouth-breathing, earache, enlarged glands, frequent colds should be a point of importance to parents, it is said.

"Be fair to your child. Your child may be handicapped. Tonsils often become diseased and stick out into the throat. Sometimes diseased tonsils do not get larger but contain little cups of pus which hold poisonous germs which cause tonsillitis and the germs may even be carried to other parts of the body and cause sickness, such as earache and enlarged glands. Adenoids, which often stop up the nose and make a child breathe through its mouth, allow much dust and germs to enter the body. Disease may be caused by large adenoids," P. T. A. leaders say.

Diseased tonsils and adenoids cause many diseases, and make children more susceptible to others, and many backward children are retarded because, with diseased throats and adenoids, they are unable to see, hear or smell properly.

This free clinic is held for the purpose of detecting these ailments and giving the children entering school in September, an equal chance and plenty of time during the summer to remedy any defects before school opens.

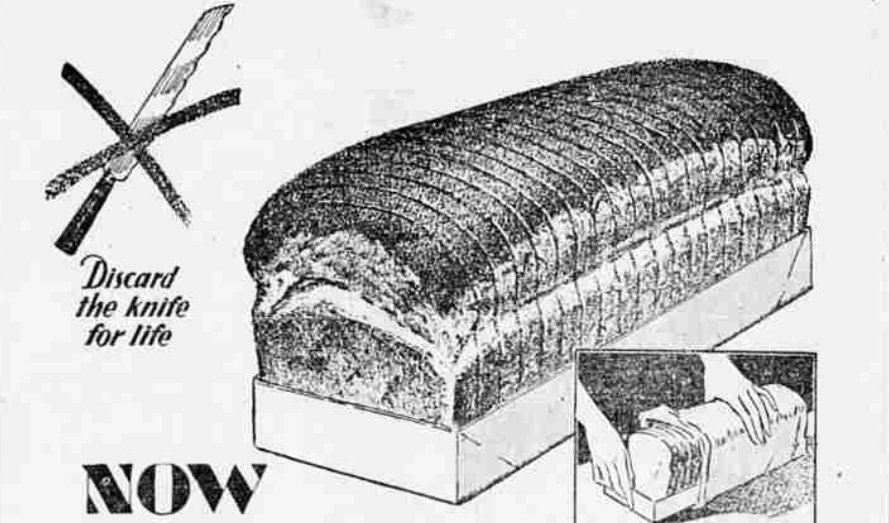
