Scholarship Loan Fund Concert Featuring Jack Dennis and Triad Choir Monday Evening, April 30

Interest is increasing daily in the concert to be given Monday evening at 8 o'clock in the First Presbyterian church as a benefit for the scholarship loan fund of the La Grande Neighborhood club, its sponsors report, and the indications are that the affair will enjoy a capacity house for two reasons—the merits of the program itself and the object for which it is being held. While the funds secured here are dispensed through the state federation, it has been shown that local funds have been used to make it possible for girls of Eastern Oregon to attend the Eastern Oregon Normal school during the past year.

The program will consist of groups of numbers by Jack Dennis, tenor soloist, former La Grande, whose musical background has been previously discussed, and by the Triad choir which has recently been reorganized. This group of 30 cultured voices has been having intensive training under the direction of Mrs. Alfred L. Richardson, since its reorganization and has attained a very advanced degree of perfection. It is stated, Mrs. Richardson's great ability both as a vocalist and as a director is very well known in this community. Her vocal background gives her a sensitive conception of the niceties of melodic balance and proportion. She has also had broad training as a conductor having studied under Rose Cousins-Heed, of Portland, with Herbert Witherspoon, when he was director of the Chicago Musical college, attending his opera classes and taking special vocal training, including repertoire. For two seasons, Mrs. Richardson was a student under Arthur Alexander, who among other things, has been guest conductor of Hollywood Bowl, himself a student under the great Jean De Hezke, of Paris. Another instructor was Oscar Sanger, vocal coach of New York City. With such a background, it is known that Mrs. Richardson is eminently qualified to bring this group of women to their present state-wide recognition.
