They stated that the convention was by far the most interesting and the most constructive they ever attended. More than 160 agents from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah were in attendance. Prominent speakers at the convention were George L. Baker, manager of the Oregon Manufacturers' association and former mayor of Portland; Palmer E. Hoyt, executive news editor of the Morning Oregonian; and B. F. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal. E. C.
