

MISSIONS BLANK LEAGUE LEADERS; PORTLAND WINNER

Old Clarence Mitchell and the Missions seem quite capable of handling the terrible Angels down within reach of the rest of the Coast League.

The veteran spitballer shut out the Los Angeles champions with a bare two hits yesterday, 5 to 0, narrowing their first place margin over the Missions to three games.

J. Millard Campbell, Los Angeles mound ace who previously had won six out of seven starts this season, allowed only seven hits in the seven innings he pitched but was badly supported. Errors were responsible for four of the six Mission runs.

At Sacramento, Chico Nicasio matched Mitchell's twisting performance in blanking Oakland, 4 to 0. Otto let the Oaks down with seven safes.

San Francisco held onto its third place post behind the Missions by downing Hollywood, 9 to 4 in a ragged series opener at Los Angeles.

Steve Coscarart, Portland's recruit third baseman, slammed the ball over the fence with the bases loaded in the tenth inning to give the Beavers a 10 to 6 decision over Seattle. The rookie hit a double and single as well. Mike Hunt, Seattle right fielder, carried off the day's batting honors with a circuit clout and three singles.

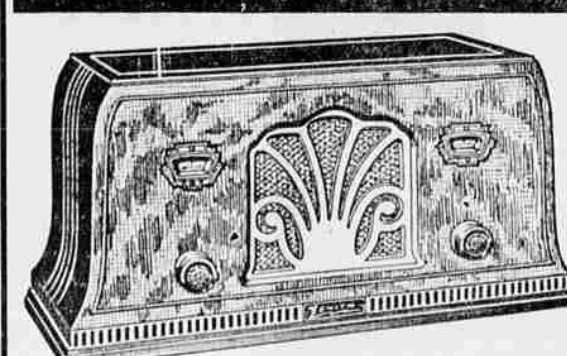
