Representatives of La Grande Club Will Leave Monday to Attend The Biennial Convention at Roseburg

Mrs. Harry G. Avery, president of the La Grande Neighborhood club, Mrs. Royal P. Tyler, senior past president, and Mrs. Sherwood Williams are leaving Monday for Roseburg as representatives of the local club to attend the biennial convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs which opens Monday. Representatives of more than 300 affiliated organizations with a total membership that approaches the 18,000 mark, are expected to attend the session, coming from all parts of the state to enjoy the elaborate program and entertainment features planned by the Roseburg Woman's club, which will act as hostess.

Registration will be held all day Monday in the Roseburg Woman's club rooms, with the formal opening of the convention slated for Monday night at the Presbyterian church. Greetings will be extended by Mayor J. E. McClintock, of Roseburg, Mrs. Charles S. Heinline, president of the hostess club and A. W. Bashford, president of the Roseburg chapter of commerce. Mrs. Charles N. Bliley of Dallas, president of the federation, will make the response. A choral concert for music groups of the federated clubs will feature the opening session, and a reception at the Elks temple for delegates and visitors, arranged by the Roseburg women, will follow the program. As a special attraction, a midnight matinee at Hunts Indian theatre will be held at the conclusion of the reception, when the Women's Civic club of Marshfield will present a dramatical, directed by Mrs. William Horrell.

Business sessions will open Tuesday morning at the Presbyterian church, with reports of officers and departmental chairmen occupying the major portion of the day. The convention banquet will be held that night at the Methodist church, with Mrs. Sallie Orr-Dunbar, of Portland, Oregon's candidate for the first vice-presidency of the General Federation of Women's clubs, as main guest. The banquet speaker will be Dr. Victor P. Morris, professor of economics at the University of Oregon, who has chosen as his subject, "Problems of Economic Planning."

Nomination of officers is scheduled for Wednesday morning and because of the state-wide interest in the choice of a new board, this session is expected to prove one of the most interesting and exciting of the entire convention program. A tea at the Roseburg country club, with the Business and Professional Women's club of Roseburg as hostess, is planned for that afternoon and a dinner for delegates and visitors will be held that night at the Presbyterian church. The presidents' night program, always one of the most interesting of the convention session, will follow the dinner, when presidents of the five districts in the state and of all member clubs who are present, will report on their past year's accomplishments.

Election will take place Thursday morning with the polls open from 8 to 10 o'clock in charge of Mrs. Henry E. Harris of Portland. The new officers will be installed as the closing feature of the program and invitations will be received for the 1936 biennial. The convention will close at noon to permit delegates to visit the new soldiers' home during the afternoon hours.

Among the many prominent speakers on the convention program are George S. Turnbull, professor of journalism at the University of Oregon, who will speak Tuesday afternoon on "Keeping the Women's Clubs Before the Public"; Carl C. Donagh, United States attorney for Oregon, who will speak Wednesday afternoon on "Law Enforcement," and Mrs. Florence Hustinspillar, of Washington, D. C., representing the United States children's bureau, who will follow Mr. Donagh on the program. Her subject will be "Trends in Child Welfare." Dr. J. Earl Eise, of Portland, chairman of the board of the Oregon branch of the American society

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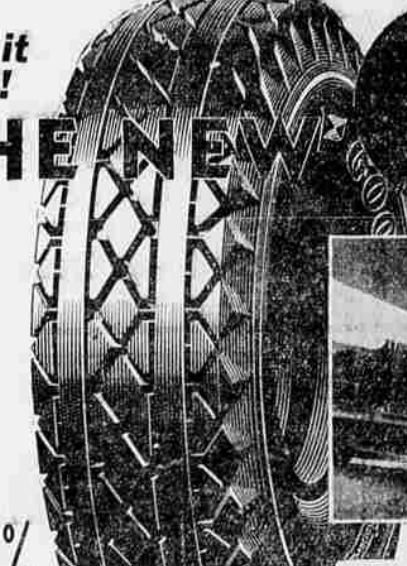
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
