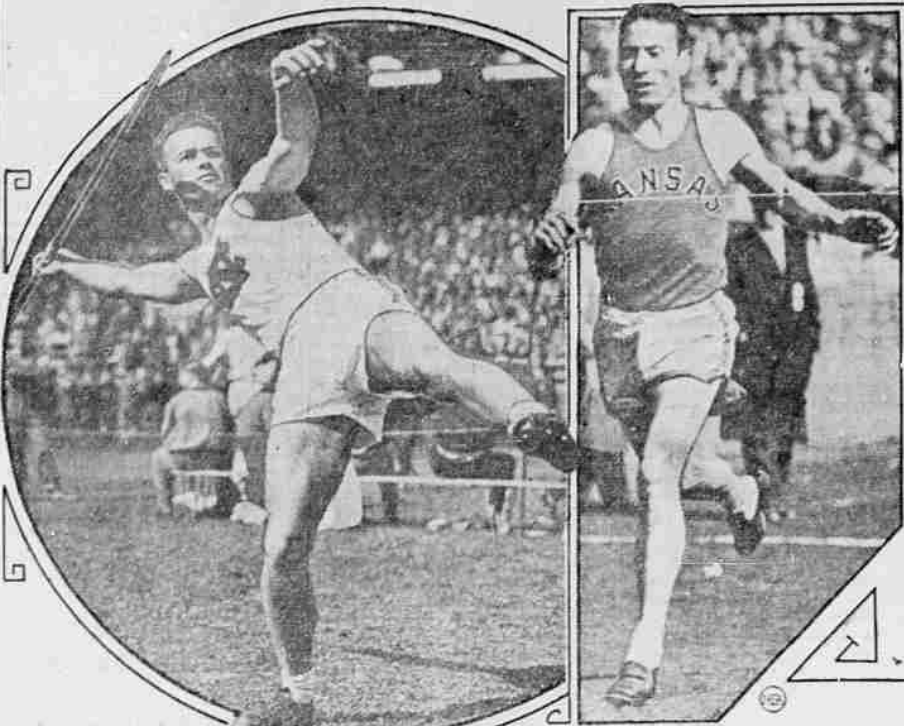

Sport Slants

The galaxy of football coaching talent now laying the spring foundation for better things this fall in the metropolitan New York sector is one of the most interesting in the college sport has known around the Big Town in years.

Nearby Princeton and Yale always hold a major interest for metropolitan fans, but right in their own backyards this season they have a chance to inspect the operations of such craftsmen as Lou Little, with his

charming Columbia Lions; Mal Severa, the Yale physician now administering fresh gridiron serum to New York University's Violeta Jimmy Crowley, the well known horseman, riding

hard on the Fordham Rams; Benny Friedman, Michigan's one-time all-America quarterback and for years a professional star, now in charge at City College; and last but not least, the affable showman, Chick Meekhan, who will have his Manhattan boys doing a lot of tricks this fall.

Each is a definite personality in football and each has some highly interesting and effective ideas about what can be done by college boys on the gridiron. Stevens and Crowley probably have the most in common,

as each employs some of the basic Notre Dame principles. Little is a master of line play and if there's anything Friedman doesn't know about the gentle art of handling or heaving a football around, his professional mates have failed to discover it.

See Trifurcate Re-Formed

Up-state observers may not find any significance in the fact Andy Kerr of Colgate and Gilmour Dobie of Cornell are joining forces. In a football coaching school at Ithaca.

At that, it may only be the case of a couple of Scotchmen getting together to swap yarns and wind up with a wee docht-and-doris but I know a number of their followers who hope it leads to something more substantial than that.

In short, the time is ripe for Cornell and Colgate to renew football relations. It would complete the up-state triumvirate, inasmuch as Cornell has resumed rivalry with Syracuse and the Syracuse-Colgate game is already an established event. It is a natural set-up and would benefit all concerned, from the financial as well as the competitive angle. If there are any academic objections, it is about time they were wiped out.

It would hardly seem that Dobie could any longer be reluctant to take on another major opponent, any more than Cornell can afford to continue major league operations with open doors on its varsity football schedule.

How About H. Bonny? To the non-partisan eye it would appear the Kansas and Penn relay carnivals have stolen something of a march on the Drake relays this spring by negotiating a home-and-home arrangement by which those persistent mile-running rivals, Glenn Cunningham of Kansas and Gene Venkze of Penn. will meet one Saturday at Lawrence and the next at Philadelphia.

All their rivalry so far has been conducted on the indoor tracks and it will be interesting to see whether the Kansas record-breaker can retain the Indian sign on his eastern rival when they try the cinderpath route. Our guess is that he will, but Venkze refuses to be discouraged, despite the fact he has discovered a 4:10 or 4:11 mile is nowhere near good enough to beat Cunningham.

Meanwhile, what to prevent Bill Henthorn joining the party at Franklin field? Certainly Cunningham would welcome the only runner to beat him this year and so would perhaps 50,000 track fans. As long as

Glenn is taking the trouble to come all the way east again, it would seem no more than courtesy for Princeton to send its star miler to the mark.

The idea of replacing the annual championship tournament of the Professional Golfers' association of America with an open-match-play event, to which any or all of the leading amateurs would be welcomed, may sound a bit intriguing but I doubt if it will appeal to the more practical-minded professionals.

In the first place, the pros, as long as they are organized and in business for themselves, should have their own championship, just as it is desirable to have the amateur women's and public links tournaments conducted separately. They are "natural" and the present open championship provides an outlet for the rivalry between amateurs and professionals at medal score competition.

Imagine the predicament the professionals would be in if, in addition to trailing an amateur like Johnny Goodman in the Open, they should also have a player such as George Dunlap beat them in a match-play tournament!

P. G. A. Pays Own Way So far as the financial side of the P. G. A. is concerned, its own championship has proved a big attraction on the whole and should feel the effects of recuperating public support this year at Buffalo, July 24 to 28.

Henry W. Comstock, general chairman of the tournament committee at Buffalo, points out that the "P. G. A. tournament has been held 16 times and has only failed to make money twice, except the first year when the event was underwritten by Rodman Wanamaker and was a free show."
