cleaned out by frost. In Wasco and Jackson counties and some parts of the Willamette valley the peach crops are expected to be good.

The pear crop of Jackson county promises to be almost normal, barring possible reduction because of a shortage of moisture reserves.

A total apple crop in the state in excess of the light crop of last year is in prospect. Wasco and Jackson counties report increases, and Malheur has fair prospects.

The prune situation is highly variable, ranging from a near failure in Douglas county to a crop at least double that of last year in Polk.

Most sections report fair to good cherry prospects, except Umatilla where frost cleaned out most of the crop.

WISE WASHING WAYS

A little lime water will remove stains made by iodine.

Do not hang up white silk shirts or blouses which you fear may turn slightly yellow. Roll them in a white cloth after washing and iron when still damp but not thoroughly wet.

If you fear a color may "run" do not put such material with other garments. Wash separately and put a little salt in cool water first, adding warm water gradually before washing.

BRUSSELS (AP)—White is the favorite color of Astrid, new queen of the Belgians.

She invariably dresses her children in white and she herself is often seen in white during the summer.

In the royal palace here she has a white bedroom and boudoir and her entire suite at the royal villa in Octend has walls and furniture painted white. White carpets and hangings are used, and even the flowers in the crystal bowls and vases have to be white.

"The facts are that King Albert was opposed to war.

"I am in a position to say that when Albert I was dead, the communists—who in fact represent the interests of international finance—were able to stand up on their hind legs and yell for revolution," Hitchcock said.

The death of Albert I, beloved king of the Belgians, was laid by physicians and government officials to a fall from a cliff near Namur, a city about 35 miles southeast of Brussels, on Saturday, Feb. 17.
