**Oregon Baseball Team Is Defeated**

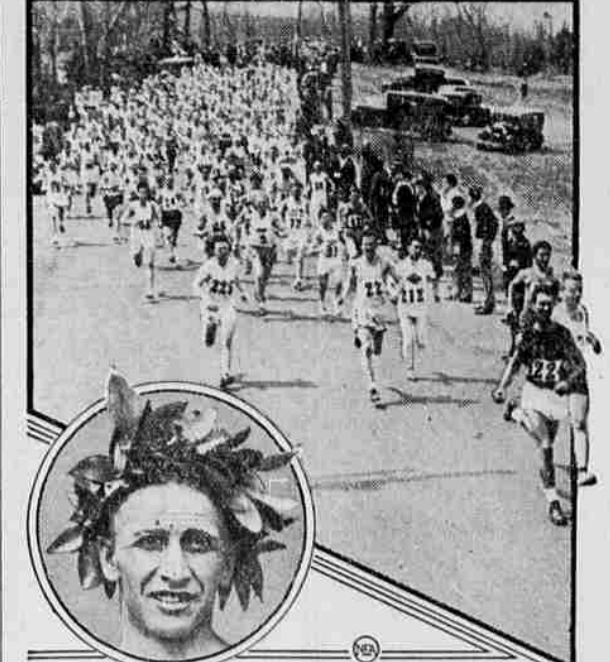
EUGENE, Ore., May 8 (AP) — The University of Oregon baseball team will attempt to gain an even break with the Washington State college baseball team here today.
