SEES STORM ON FAR AWAY WORLD

CLEVELAND (AP)—An atmospheric disturbance covering 40,000,000 square miles is being closely watched by Prof. J. J. Nassau of Case School of Applied Science, who has trained a telescope on the planet Jupiter, 400,000,000 miles away.

He first noticed the storm April 29 while examining an "interesting black spot" on the "north equatorial belt" of the planet.

AMERICA TO INSIST UPON DEBT PAYMENT

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Coincident with a statement by President Roosevelt that the United States expects full payment on war debts in June—unless there are convincing reasons for a reduction—Andre De Laboulaye, the French ambassador, conferred today with state department officials on that country's obligation of nearly \$4,000,000,000 on part of which she is in default.

After the conference the ambassador told the reporters he had made no formal debt statement to Phillips.

Former Cleveland Bankers Indicted

CLEVELAND, May 9 (AP)—Five former Cleveland bankers and a former county official were indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of making a false financial statement and using the mails to promote a scheme to defraud.

The latest indictments, climaxing a year of investigation by department of justice agents, center around alleged "window dressing" of statements of condition of the Union Trust Co. and Guardian Trust Co., which went into liquidation.

Diamond Jubilee At Medford For All of Oregon

MEDFORD, Ore. (Special)—The cooperation of all Oregon citizens is sought for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration in Medford and Jacksonville, June 3 to 9. The celebration is statewide in character, honoring the early pioneers whose determined efforts made statehood possible in 1859, and whose untiring labors laid the foundation for amazing progress in the past 75 years.

Among the outstanding features of the week will be historical exhibits and pioneer parades. Committees in charge are particularly interested to have all parts of the state represented, and are anxious to contact owners of pioneer relics which can be used to advantage during the celebration.

Jubilee officials have made arrangements for the transportation of this material to Medford, and guarantee its safe return. One of the largest historical exhibits in the history of the state is planned, as well as the most elaborate parades ever attempted, all of which depends a great deal upon other sections of Oregon.

The Diamond Jubilee celebration has been designated by the state legislature, and through proclamation of Governor Julius Meier, as being the official observance of Oregon's 75th anniversary, and has already attracted considerable attention along the entire length of the Pacific coast. Jubilee week is not inspired by the thought of entertainment alone, but by the opportunity of paying tribute to the early Oregonians, living and dead.

- 2 1/2 cups cold ENKAY MILK
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 squares chocolate (broken)
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 baked 9-in. pie shell
- 3 egg whites
- 6 tablespoons sugar

Add chocolate to ENKAY MILK. Heat in double boiler. After chocolate is melted, beat with rotary eggbeater till blended. Sift cornstarch, salt and sugar together, then add a little of the chocolate mixture and stir until smooth. Put it back in double boiler, add butter and keep stirring until thickened. Cook for ten minutes longer, stirring constantly. For a small amount over egg yolks while stirring vigorously. Return to double boiler and cook till thickened. Take off stove and add vanilla. Cool. Pour into pie shell. Beat egg whites till stiff; add sugar, then beat till mixture thickens again. Pipe lightly on top. Bake in a moderate oven till slightly browned (about 20 minutes).
