

DREIBACH AND CONKLIN LEADING E. O. N. HITTERS

When the Eastern Oregon Normal school baseball team plays what may be its final home game, double header here Saturday against Whitman college, Coach Bob Quinn will have three of his strongest hitters in the lineup—Dreibach, catcher; Conklin, first sacker; and Wagener, second baseman. All three are hitting over .300 after playing in all the games this season.

Dreibach and Conklin are tied for the leadership with 10 hits each in 28 times at bat for a percentage of .357. Wagener isn't far behind with 10 blows in 33 times up for a count of .303. Worthley, next high among the regulars with seven hits in 24 times up, has completed his schooling.

Conklin leads the field in extra-base hits with two homers, two triples and two two-baggers.

Encouraged by success in the first encounter, Sacramento continues its efforts tonight to be the first team in the Pacific Coast league this season to wrest a series from the pace setting Los Angeles outfit.

Hal Turpin, on the mound for Portland, turned in some excellent hurling to hold the Missions to the low score despite five errors committed by his team mates. Turpin allowed the Missions six hits.

The San Francisco Seals had little trouble in defeating Oakland, 9 to 2, and the Hollywood Stars won the season's first night game at Los Angeles from Seattle, 3 to 1.

INCOMES UNDER \$30,000 TO PAY LESS TAXES NOW

WASHINGTON (AP)—The married taxpayer with a net income up to and including \$25,000 will pay less than at present under the new tax bill.

Nationalization Of Silver is Held Near

It is regarded as the White House as nothing new to have a silver backing for currency. It was said that an even larger percentage than the proposed 25 prevailed during the administration of Presidents McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt.

Approximately 12 per cent was said to prevail now, but the president is willing to go up to 25 as proposed at the London economic conference.

For the government to take over the silver stocks of the nation, as was done in the case of gold, he feels legislative authority is necessary.

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—The price of spot silver was raised 1 1/2 cents to 45 1/2 cents an ounce today in response to rapid advance in futures prices near the close of yesterday's market.
