(Incidentally, her picture gets into the papers again, this time with the producer beside her. This is a realistic touch neglected by the fictioneer.)

Happy Ending. The happy ending, of course, is a contract. Our beauty, Julian Graham, is ecstatically happy. She is a movie actress. She will talk at length about her experience, seriously advising young girls not to attempt Hollywood as she did, without entree to the studios.

She is no longer Julian, but Julia. And Hollywood expects an epidemic of similar cases — just another cycle!

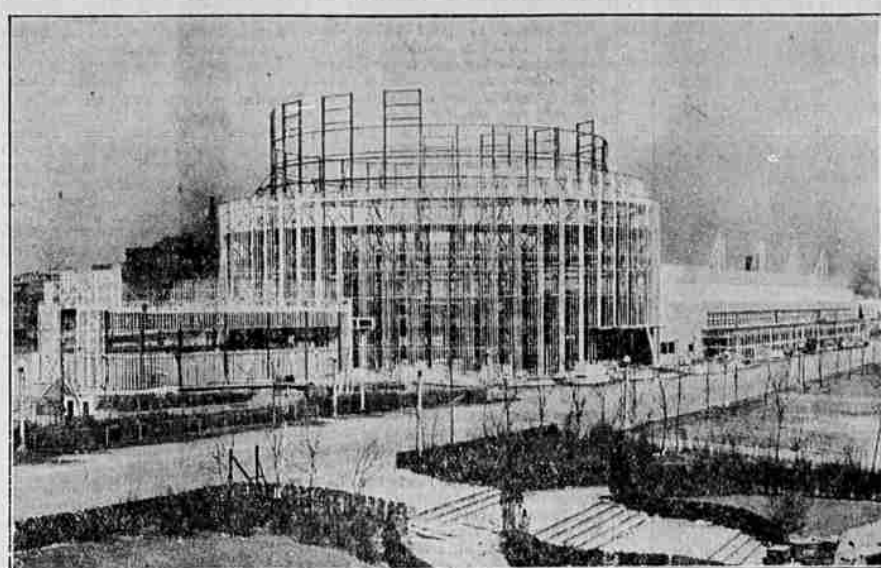

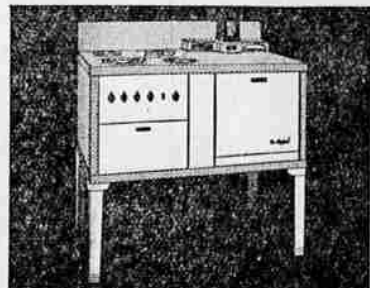

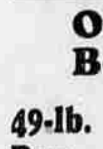
