THE WISDOM TOOTH
Precisely why the third molar is called the wisdom tooth is hard to establish. Perhaps it is because by the time this tooth has erupted and given its victim all the varieties of difficulties to which it can be father, the sufferer is "wise" to all possible dental afflictions.

The tooth is interesting in that it apparently is a regressing member of our dental array. It is subject to all sorts of vagaries in development, its eruption through the gum, position, and form.

When completely within the gum, it is believed the wisdom tooth may remain intact, but when it breaks through and is exposed to the organisms of the mouth, it has a tendency to decay promptly. For this reason it is a common and important source of infection. It is also believed by many to contribute to the development of Vincent's angina or trench mouth.

In the endeavor to break through the gum and assume its place in the jaw, the so-called impacted wisdom tooth is liable to give rise to a wide variety of neuralgia pains. These may involve not only the nerves of the face but may affect remote nerve structures, including the central nervous system.

Decay of the wisdom tooth, leading to the formation of a focus of infection, will give rise to local manifestations and to all that vast list of symptoms associated with focal infections. The upper wisdom tooth,

when decayed, may involve the maxillary sinus, that is, the sinus in the cheek bone.

Because of the readiness with which the wisdom tooth decays, and because of its liability to fall to erupt and hence to give rise to difficulties, it is worth while having special attention paid to this tooth.
