# JAPANESE WARN CHINA, LEAGUE

 TOKYO, May 10 (AP)—Japan today gave advance notice of a probable warning to both China and the league of nations as to "the advisability of suspension" of Dr. Ludwig Rajchman's plans for financial aid to China by the league.

An "inspired" statement by the Rengo (Japanese) news agency declared that "Japan cannot countenance" such plans.

The warning was regarded as a step toward effectuating the "hands-off-China" policy which Koki Hirota, Japanese foreign minister, enunciated April 17 and which resulted in immediate diplomatic inquiries in Tokyo by the governments of Great Britain, the United States, and France.

Regarding Dr. Rajchman's report which suggests financial assistance to China toward the construction of highways and improved farming facilities, the Rengo statement says the Japanese may take measures to "cope with the situation likely to arise."

## SAM BROWN IN CITY TODAY ON HURRIED TRIP

Sam Brown, Gevrais farmer and candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, was a La Grande visitor today, stopping here on a brief Eastern Oregon trip. He planned to make no public talks today but was visiting many business men and farmers while here.

Mr. Brown spoke at Adams grange last night and reached La Grande at 1 o'clock this morning. This evening he was to visit Wallowa county and then be back in Wasco county Saturday and in Portland Sunday.

Mr. Brown said that conditions looked to him to be favorable for his nomination.

## PLEASURES OF SMOKING

With the possible exception of alcohol, there is probably no substance used by man about which such marked and bitter controversies have raged as tobacco.

Some few have sung its praise, calling it by sweet and poetic names and extolling its virtues and pacifying qualities. But its opponents have been even more eloquent in presenting its evils.

Out of this welter of argument and discussion, a few facts bearing on tobacco capable of withstanding critical analysis have come to the fore. Thus, it has been shown that some individuals are markedly sensitive to tobacco and suffer grave injury from its use. The relationship of tobacco smoking to certain disturbances in the peripheral, or outer, circulatory system has been clearly demonstrated by a number of medical men.

Most recently a new set of facts has been brought forth which relate not to the injurious, but rather to the pleasurable effects of smoking. The soothing effects of smoking, the relief from fatigue and irritability gained by a "drag," and tobacco as a means of appeasing unsatisfied hunger has been accorded substantiation by laboratory observations.

From the Laboratory of Applied Physiology at Yale comes a report to the effect that smoking produces a definite though temporary increase in the concentration of blood sugar, and a corresponding increase in the rate of sugar combustion, in the body.

The relationship of the level of sugar in the blood to fatigue and irritability has been well established. Both of these states are sometimes associated with a low or fasting level of the blood sugar.

Nicotine as was shown more than twenty years ago, affects the adrenal glands and results in the release into the blood, from its storage places, of reserve sugar. It is in this way, perhaps, that we can account physiologically for the reported relief from fatigue and nervousness as well as disappearance of hunger.
