

SENATORS AGAIN DEFEAT ANGELS-- PORTLAND BEATEN

 Sacramento has accomplished today what no other Pacific coast league team had been able to do this season—take two consecutive games from the heavy hitting Los Angeles outfit. The Senators defeated the circuit leaders last night, 4 to 2.

Meanwhile, the San Francisco Missions edged a game closer to the Angels, trailing Portland, 9 to 9. Young Wayne Cooney, on the Mission mound, held the Beavers to five scattered blows while his team mates whopped four Portland hurriers for 14 bingles. Cooney, who started for Portland, pitched only one-third of an inning—and was charged with the defeat. The Missions found him for four hits and Chelini, who succeeded him, for one to score five runs in the opening frame.

The San Francisco Beals continued in third place, but lost ground to the Missions when Oakland nosed them out, 5 to 4.

Hollywood ran roughshod over Seattle, winning 16 to 2. The Stars collected 18 hits. They amassed an 11-run lead in the first three innings. Outfielder Hunt of the Indians hit a homer.

COYOTES TO PLAY E. O. N. NEXT FALL

COLLEGE OF IDAHO, Caldwell—A nine-game football schedule, comprising four northwest conference contests and culminated with a game against Larry Wolf's Oregon Normal school, will be played at Boise, Thanksgiving day, was announced Tuesday by Coach Loren H. Basler of the College of Idaho.

In addition to the four northwest conference contests, three games will be played against Idaho state institutions and two with Oregon state Normal schools. The Coyotes will meet the University of Idaho Vandals at Moscow, November 11, in the stadium in Caldwell and on the lake for next fall, Basler said. The Coyotes will open the season September 29 with a night game against Idaho State Normal at Albion at Caldwell and on successive weekends will meet College of Puget Sound, October 5; Eastern Oregon Normal school of La Grande, Ore., October 12, and Albany college, October 19, all night games to be played in Caldwell.

On October 27 the Coyotes will go to Pocatello for the annual renewal of hostilities with their oldest opponents, the University of Idaho southern branch Tigers. Games with the Tigers date back to the time when the southern branch was the old Idaho Technical Institute and football players were long whiskers.

The University of Idaho game, to be played this year at Moscow, is slated for November 3, while on November 12 the Coyotes will go to Walla Walla for an Armistice day clash with Whitman college Missionaries. Linfield college at Caldwell November 17 and the Thanksgiving day game in Boise against Oregon Normal school will complete the schedule.

Of the games the College of Puget Sound, Albany college, Linfield college and Whitman college games are northwest conference games. Last year the Coyotes played only three conference games, losing to Pacific university and the College of Puget Sound and tying the score with Whitman.

Of opponents on the Coyotes' slate for next fall, six were on the schedule last year, two more represent the renewal of hostilities after at least a year's lapse and one team, Oregon Normal school, is on the Coyotes' program for the first time.

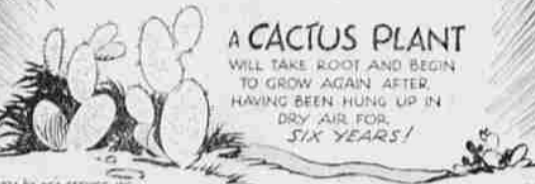
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THIS CURIOUS WORLD By William Ferguson

Pendleton High Will Lose Many Star Athletes

Fourteen lettermen from Pendleton High school athletic squads will either be graduated with the class of 1934 next month or will have used up their eligibility for sports under the rules of the Oregon High School Athletic association. Of this number one is a three-sport letterman, five are winners in two sports, and the remainder have qualified for the award in one branch of athletics.

Jimmie Scribner, who is finishing his high school course in June, has been ineligible for competition this year under the nine-semester rule but had previously earned letters in football, basketball and track. Two sport lettermen who will be graduated next month are Jack Godwin, football and track; William Largent, basketball and track; Harold Rees, football and basketball; and Francis Schmidt, football and track. Orval McCormach, who completes his basketball and track eligibility with the present semester, expects to try out for the Buckaroo football squad next fall as it will be his last chance at a high school sport.

One-sport lettermen include Ralph Bond, Art Markham, Wesley McDonald, Raoul Perard and James York, football; Harold Rosenberg, basketball; and James Motowaglin and Harold Seary, track.

Rees and McCormach have earned the varsity awards more times than any of the other athletes who finish in June. Rees is a three-stripe letterman in basketball and earned a letter last fall in football. McCormach has won two letters each in basketball and track. Perard is a three-year letterman in football and Rosenberg has won an award in basketball for the same number of times.

Cougars Defeat O. S. C. Nine 7-3

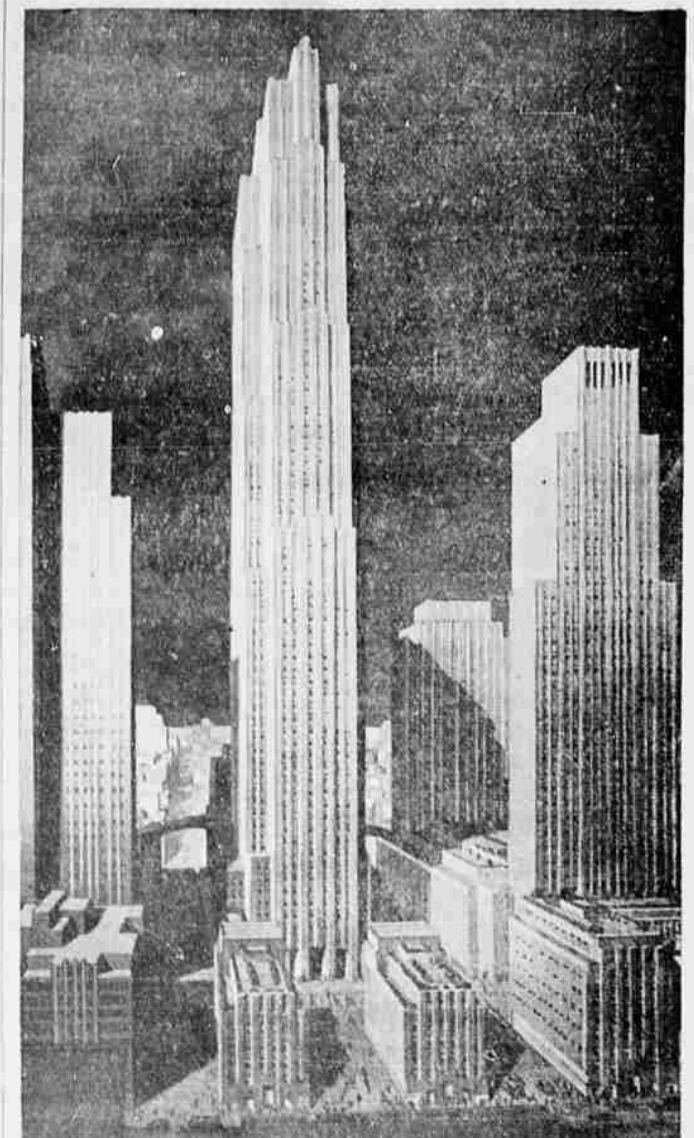
