

ANGELS WALLOP SENATORS 11-1; PORTLAND LOSES

The heavy hitting Los Angeles aggregation today had checked the onslaught of the Sacramento Senators, the first club to win from the Pacific coast leaders, twice in a row. The heavy guns of the Angels were brought steadily into play last night and the Senators were defeated, 11 to 1.

The second place San Francisco Mission, who gained two games on Los Angeles this week, made it three straight over Portland, winning 3 to 2. It was a tough loss for El Bryan, heavy hurler, who held the San Francisco scoreless except for the third inning when they made their three runs on as many hits. A Portland rally in the sixth inning was cut short after one run when Third Baseman James Stroner nailed First Baseman Burns' sliding drive and converted what might easily have been a hit into a double play.

The San Francisco Seals took Oakland's measure, 4 to 1, and Hollywood defeated Seattle for the third time in a row, winning 5-4.

WHITMAN ABOUT ON EVEN TERMS WITH E. O. NINE

On comparative strength, the Eastern Oregon Normal school and Whitman college baseball teams are just about even, at least on records of performance. The two teams will meet at the Normal school field tomorrow in a double header, to begin at 2 p. m. and each game will go seven innings.

EXPLAINS PROTEST OF BALL PLAYERS

A bombshell was exploded in the midst of the Blue Mountain league here yesterday when it became known that the La Grande baseball nine had submitted formal protest to Roy Farnham, league president, concerning umpires, certain players, and field supervision of the Baker baseball team, which the La Grande squad travels to Baker to meet next Sunday afternoon in the sixth league game of the season.

The Baker squad leads the league with a record of five wins and no defeats, while the La Grande squad is in a three-way tie for third spot in the league. Rivalry between the two squads is running high and it is expected that the game at Baker next Sunday will be a bitterly fought contest between two exceptionally evenly matched teams. Whether or not Joe Palmer, stellar hurler for the Baker nine, who tossed a no-hit, no-run game against Elgin last Sunday, will be able to oppose the local squad next Sunday, is the big question in Baker at present. It is reported that Palmer, injured his arm in last Sunday's game and details of the Baker club state that it is questionable that he will be able to perform next Sunday. In case Palmer's arm has not recovered Jack Dreishach, young southpaw, will doubtless face the La Grander.

Continued by an Observer reporter concerning the protest filed against the Baker team, D. W. Hall, manager of the local nine stated: "The protest was directed at the Baker umpiring staff, three Baker players who, according to my interpretation of the constitution and by-laws of the league, are ineligible to play, and lack of supervision of the crowds at the Baker field, which permits spectators to surge onto the playing field along the foul lines in tense moments of play."

"Complaints against the Baker umpires have been heard by the score as a result of purported questionable officiating in the last two games Baker has played. It is my duty to see that the La Grande squad gets fair and impartial officiating when away from home, as well as here in La Grande, and it is to that end

that I have requested Roy Farnham, president of the league, to see that proper officials were appointed to handle next Sunday's game. It is one of the most disheartening things in baseball to players and to spectators, to see sparkingly executed and thrilling plays marred by questionable umpiring.

"Protests against the three Baker players were backed up by sufficient evidence to cause the league president to make a further investigation of the conditions at Baker, and I am planning to attend the meeting at Baker this evening to see that the La Grande club gets a fair deal. If the Baker club can prove conclusively that they are within the rules as stated in the Blue Mountain league constitution and by-laws then the protest will be quickly withdrawn."
