TERM WILL LAST
UNTIL JULY 27

Special Session of Two
Weeks, Included With

The regular summer session of the Eastern Oregon Normal school will open at La Grande Monday, June 18. It was announced here today by H. E. Inlow, president, and Alfred Powers, dean and director of the general extension of the state system of higher education. The term will last until July 27.

Courses, all to be taught by experienced and expert faculty members, will be offered in art, economics, education, geography, history, music, physical education, psychology, health education, science, sociology and English.

A special session, to last two weeks, from June 18 to June 29, will be of unusual value, also, it is pointed out. Courses in this session will be taught by the following instructors: Thelma Irene Whaley, art; Kate L. Houk, teaching; Arta P. Lawrence, primary education; Jennie Peterson, music teaching; and Elmo N. Stevenson, nature study.

WALL STREET MEASURE GOES TO THE HOUSE

Senate's Passage of Bill Is
Culmination of Years
of Agitation

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—The Fletcher-Rayburn stock market control bill was passed by the senate today and sent to conference with the house for adjustment of differences.

The senate's action was the culmination of years of agitation for regulation of the exchanges and assured final approval of a bill satisfactory to those demanding it.

Shortly before the bill passed, the senate adopted the administration amendment to modify the securities act of 1933, and rejected a series of more liberal proposals.

Amendments to modify the stock bill went through as recommended by the senate voting committee.

As the senate voted on the bill, Ferdinand Pecora, counsel for the banking committee, and Roland Red-

ALL NATION WILL HONOR MOTHERS

NEW YORK, May 12 (AP)—The millions of Sons and Daughters in the nation will pay tribute tomorrow—mother's day—to their mothers.

Messages, reunions, church services, gifts and flowers are on the program for the country's "traditional holiday."

Carnations, the traditional Mother's day flower—pink for living mothers, white for mothers dead—stock florists' shops throughout the land.

President Roosevelt, in a proclamation, asked that the day be observed by display of the flag, "by the usual tokens and messages of affection to our mothers," and by aiding in mother and child relief work.

Wheat Today

CHICAGO, May 12 (AP)—Dominated in the end by reported moisture at many places where even the slightest relief from drought was badly needed wheat today closed higher and lower.

Throughout the day, price changes were extremely rapid coming to variable advances from different sections. Estimates were current that United States winter wheat had been deteriorating 3,000,000 bushels a day, and that the 1934 prospect for the entire country, including spring wheat, was 30,000,000 bushels below domestic requirements.

Wheat closed ½¢ under yesterday's finish July 85½¢ corn unchanged to ½¢ lower, oats 1½¢ 1½¢ down, and provisions unchanged to 10 cents up.

BOLIVIAN OUTPOSTS BOMBED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12 (AP)—Extreme reluctance to call out the Oregon national guard to preserve order among the striking longshoremen on the waterfront here was expressed by Governor Meier today as he engaged in a conference with city officials and labor union representatives in an attempt to prevent further violence.

SEATTLE, May 12 (AP)—William H. Concanon, 45, collapsed and died here early today of a skull fracture and Joseph J. McCullough, 24, a University of Washington student, was being held without charge while police investigated the case.

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—President Roosevelt definitely assumed the position today that the next move in the who's-in-default game is up to the European debtor nations.

ASUNCION, Paraguay, May 12 (AP)—Paraguayan bombing planes swooped low over the Bolivian outposts on the Vaquearca front today and subjected them to a concentrated bombardment. This followed closely upon a protest against bombardment by Bolivian planes of the Paraguayan cities of Guaraní and Mihanovich.

FIVE-CENT OFFER MADE ON CHERRIES

THE DALLES, May 12 (AP)—Offers of five cents a pound for cherries have created a new note of optimism here.

Buyers for Libby, McNeill & Libby are in the field here with five-cent contracts for Royal Ann's. Last year these cherries brought about 2½ cents a pound when fruit could be sold at all.

The crop here this year probably will not run more than 50 per cent of normal. It is predicted, because of rain and frost during pollenization.

PLAN NEW SUPPLY OF WATER FOR PARK

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special)—A new water supply will be provided at Emigrant Springs park under the C. C. C. work now under way, says Sam Boardman, state parks engineer, who was here Thursday evening.

Boardman says a new spring will be developed and water provided by gravity flow for a large reservoir that will be constructed.

Many other improvements are also proposed for the 20-mile area through the mountains. A driveway and camping place will be established at Viewpoint, where there is an abandoned service station. This is a scenic point where Squaw Canyon may be seen, and Mr. Boardman believes the work will be helpful. A parking place will also be provided along the highway.

TENNESSEE HAS SNATCHING CASE

Mother of 10-Year-Old
Boy Believes Divorced
Father Is Responsible
for Abduction

LOS ANGELES, May 12 (AP)—Confidence that William F. Gettle, kidnapped Beverly Hills millionaire, was still alive, was expressed today by Ernest E. Noon, attorney for the family who is acting as the sole intermediary with the kidnapers.

Noon said that he had received numerous telephone calls since the kidnapping at the Arcadia country estate last Wednesday midnight, when the 46-year-old man was seized by two masked gunmen as a climax to a party given by Gettle in celebration of the completion of improvements to his new country estate.

The reason for this assurance that Gettle had not been harmed, were not divulged by Noon. He did say, however, that he had no knowledge that a friend of the millionaire had received a letter in Gettle's handwriting since the kidnapping, urging that the demands of the kidnapers be met.

Noon, in the meantime, announced that an agreement had been reached with investigating officers that the manhunt for the kidnapers will be held in abeyance until Monday noon.
