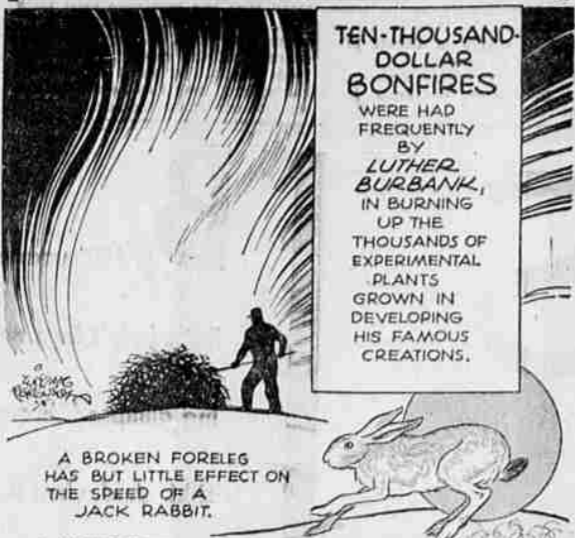

BARCELONA, Spain, May 14 (AP)—Max Schmeling's second encounter with Paulino Uzcudun had gone into the record books as a draw today but the impression was general he easily had earned a decision he didn't get.

Through 12 rounds, the former heavyweight champion pounded away at Paulino's face, had the veteran Basque bleeding badly from the sixth round on, and outboxed him by a wide margin in the feature match of Montjuich stadium's 160-round boxing carnival yesterday.
