**FIRST TELEPHONE LINES
FOUGHT BY CHEROKEES**
TAHEQUAH, Okla., May 13.—Serious objections by Cherokee Indians to the first telephone line in Oklahoma were recalled by E. D. Hicks, builder of the line, as he retired from active telephone service.

The pioneer line, from Tahlequah to Muskogee, was constructed in the summer of 1896, after a short demonstration line had convinced the Cherokees that the telephone would "talk Indian" as well as English.

S. Bennett, No. 19, of Baker, Mrs. Bowena Adey, No. 16, of Enterprise and Mrs. Addella Bartholomew, of No. 8, of Echo and the deputies, Mrs. Florence Rhinehart, of Enterprise, Mrs. Meyers and Mrs. Bennett.

Mrs. Bartholomew was the general chairman of the day, opening the program at 1:30, the first item being a community sing. The flag service and the reception of distinguished visitors was given by the Echo review, excellently done by 34 women. Mrs. Bartholomew's greetings were responded to by Mrs. Ward. After a reading by Mrs. Genevieve Scott, of No. 10, a class of 19 candidates was presented by the Baker review, Mrs. Bennett and her corps giving the initiatory work. Certificates were presented by a team of ten members from No. 10. Following Mrs. Ward's address, the flower drill by Enterprise, a school of instruction occupied the rest of the afternoon.

The banquet at 6:30 in the I. O. O. F. hall was quite an outstanding feature of the day, with the long tables decorated with masses of flowers, favors for each one seated and informal singing, speeches and yells during the few hours. Mrs. Ward presented a toast to the assembled group and the flower drill by Enterprise, a school of instruction occupied the rest of the afternoon.

The interruption was but temporary. Ernest E. Noon, family intermediary seeking release of Gettle, held a fruitless visit in Downey early today. The denouement of as bizarre a series of maneuvers as ever was written into police records here came about 3:30 a. m. when the intermediary, traveling in a small coupe with a black satchel at his side, containing the ransom in \$5 and \$10 bills, shot his way out of a trap. Before he whipped out a revolver to protect himself from a group that he believed was a band of hijackers he had spent some four and one-half hours patiently driving through metropolitan Los Angeles, picking up at intervals instructions which were to have led to the actual delivery of the money to the kidnapers.

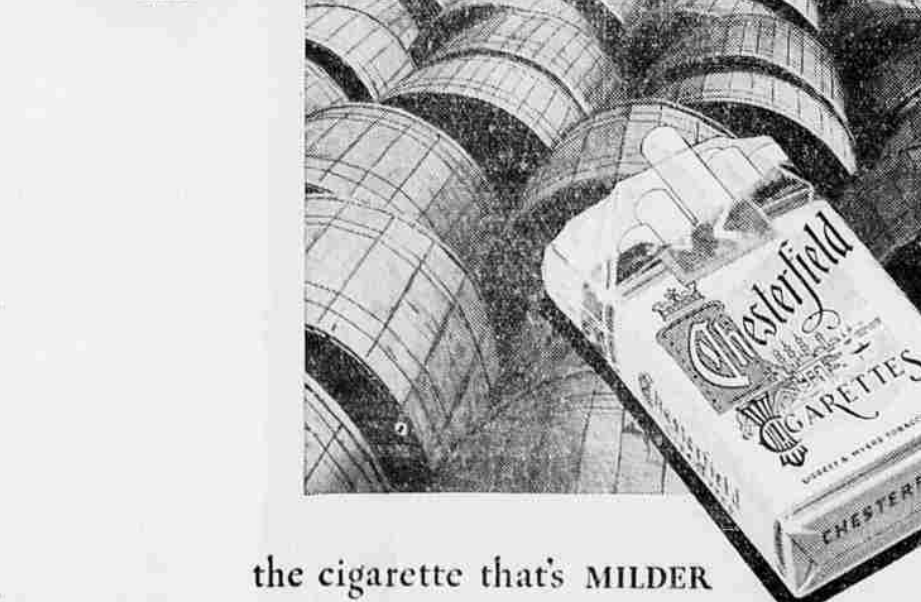
