## Edgar G. Willett, Born Here, Dies At Boise, Idaho

BAKER, Ore. (Special)—Edgar Glen Willett, former Baker fireman, died in the Boise hospital May 12, according to information received by relatives here. He recently underwent a major operation and had been in the hospital for a month.

Mr. Willett was born May 5, 1893, in La Grande and lived in this community for 39 years. He was employed by the Baker fire department for seven years after 1919 and for the last eight years had engaged in the barber business. Mr. Willett moved to Boise three years ago. He was a member of the Eagles lodge in Boise.

The deceased is survived by his widow, Florence; a daughter, Vera Willett of Boise; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Willett of Baker; a brother, Roy D. Willett of Baker and two sisters, Mrs. Blanche Truitt of Baker, and Mrs. Vera Murchison, of La Grande. He also leaves several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 3 this afternoon in the Baker Funeral Home with Rev. E. P. Wals officiating. Interment will be in Mt. Hope cemetery.

At Pullman yesterday, behind Irvine's five-hit pitching, they won from the Vandals, 5 to 3. The Cougars have lost only one of four starts, with Oregon in second place with five wins and two defeats.

## Oregon Petroleum Industries Board Replies to State

Continued charges in news dispatches from Salem to the effect that the gasoline industry is seeking to force a higher price upon the State of Oregon in its purchase of gasoline than the normal price structure prevailing on the Pacific coast, were declared misleading today by the Oregon Petroleum Industries Committee which pointed out:

"Reports from Salem have declared that gasoline could be purchased outside of the state at a lower price than exists here. However, they have failed to tell that these purchases can only be made in areas affected by disastrous price wars, disastrous to retail dealers and to supplying companies.

"Statements have also been published in Salem indicating that the state had to pay 21½¢ per gallon, the prevailing retail price. This, too, is misleading. As a matter of fact, since May 1 the state government has been able to purchase gasoline at Salem at 17¢ per gallon in tank cars. "The bids for business of the state government are controlled by the president's code for fair competition for the petroleum industry which states that such bids shall be made on the basis of the seller's posted price at time and place of delivery. Any person selling petroleum products to the state government must comply with this rule, except that a top price may be bid, but in no event shall the top price be lower than 25 per cent more than the posted price on the date the bid is made and then not for a period exceeding three months."
