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ENTITLED TO SUPPORT

Local Democrats should view with favor the candidacy of J. W. Leonhardt, of La Grande, for his party nomination for superintendent of public instruction. Leonhardt, who has an excellent record, who has proved his merit in the years he has taught school here, and who certainly has nothing that detracts from his qualifications for the position he seeks, should receive the 100 per cent support of the Democratic voters of Union county.

Leonhardt has been teaching school for 21 years, and during that time was principal at Gladstone for seven years and superintendent at Milwaukie for seven years. He now is principal of Central school here, and is also president of the Young Democrats of Union county. He emerged from the World War a second lieutenant and also saw service with the 3rd Oregon on the Mexican border.

Present indications are that Leonhardt very likely will be the Democratic candidate for the superintendency in the fall election.

the winter and spring making the little paper flowers.

"At the close of the World War, grateful nations and communities erected monuments to the thousands of soldiers who had died and were buried on the battlefields of France. This was man's way of building a memorial which should always stand as a tribute to those who had given their lives that we might live in security. But God and nature fashioned a living memorial which marks the last resting place of those who paid the supreme sacrifice, the little blood-red poppy growing wild on the fields of France. Even amidst the terrible devastation of battle this brave little flower did its best to cover the scars made by shells and guns. Because of this it is very fitting that once each year an army of peace-loving women go forth on the streets of our cities and towns, selling the Memorial flower that the Am-

erican public may help pay its just debt to those for whom the war will never end.

"In the spring of each year the poppies burst forth on the battle fields of France and in the spring of each year the little paper poppies are fashioned by our disabled on hospital beds. Many of these disabled veterans are able to make but a few poppies each day, but how eagerly they await your orders and the only work for which they are fitted! For many weeks they have been waiting to earn the money they need so badly and what pleasure it gives them to really be earning for their loved ones at home.

"The proceeds of our poppy sales are all used for hospital and child welfare work. Half of the proceeds are used by the various units in their own communities, the other half being used by the department for work in our hospitals and for the children of our disabled. Our workers are all volunteer workers, not one of them receiving any reward of any kind other than the knowledge of having helped those who cannot help themselves," said Mrs. Maxam, explaining the drive.

LAHINCH, Irish Free State, May 16 (AP)—The story of "missing death by inches" as they flew over the Atlantic, fighting leaking gasoline and a smoking coughing engine, was recounted today by Lieut. Cesare Sabelli of Italy and Capt. George Pond of the United States.
They cracked up their big monoplane Leonardo Da Vinci in a one-acre field near here at 8:30 p. m. last night when the motor failed completely after they had been out from New York 32 hours, 8 minutes on an attempted flight to Rome.

This, the second year of baseball for L. H. S., shows a distinct improvement over 1933. When the La Granderes wound up in the cellar with one win and five losses. Next year the Tigers expect to be a real factor in the pennant battle.

There was plenty to see in Tuesday's game, but it was a surprise bunting attack by the Tigers in the fifth inning that gave the fans the biggest kick.

With the score 4 to 3 in favor of La Grande, Arnoldus, first baseman, struck Henry's error. Then Walden sacrificed him to second, but was safe himself on Reed's error. Leonard, next up, singled, and Robertson laid down a pretty bunt and both Knezevich and Phippen, Elgin battery mates, made a dash for the ball while Robertson streaked it for first. Then both decided it was the other's and stopped — and Robertson was safe with a scratch hit to his record and Arnoldus had scored! With the bases full and none out Biggs laid down similar bunt and Walden streaked home, the Elgin infield handling the ball too slowly. Leonard also scored that inning on a passed ball.

Leonard pitched the first three innings for the Tigers and receives credit for the victory, his teammates bringing in four runs — enough to win — while he held Elgin to one hit and no scores. Young relieved Leonard in the fourth, and was promptly hammered for three scores before he settled down. From then on Young was master of the situation allowing two hits in three frames.

Defensively, the Tigers played their best ball of the season, making only two errors and completing one double play. A second double almost resulted but Walden dropped the ball on a sure throw from Biggs in right field.

The prize "batter" of the day came in the second inning when Arnoldus, with the bases loaded, stepped up and whacked the ball over center-fielder's head for a home run. But after he came in, it was learned he missed touching second base, so only two of the runners on base when he hit were counted as scores and Arnoldus' homer went for a single. But then, big leaguers have done the same thing!

A fair-sized crowd witnessed the game.

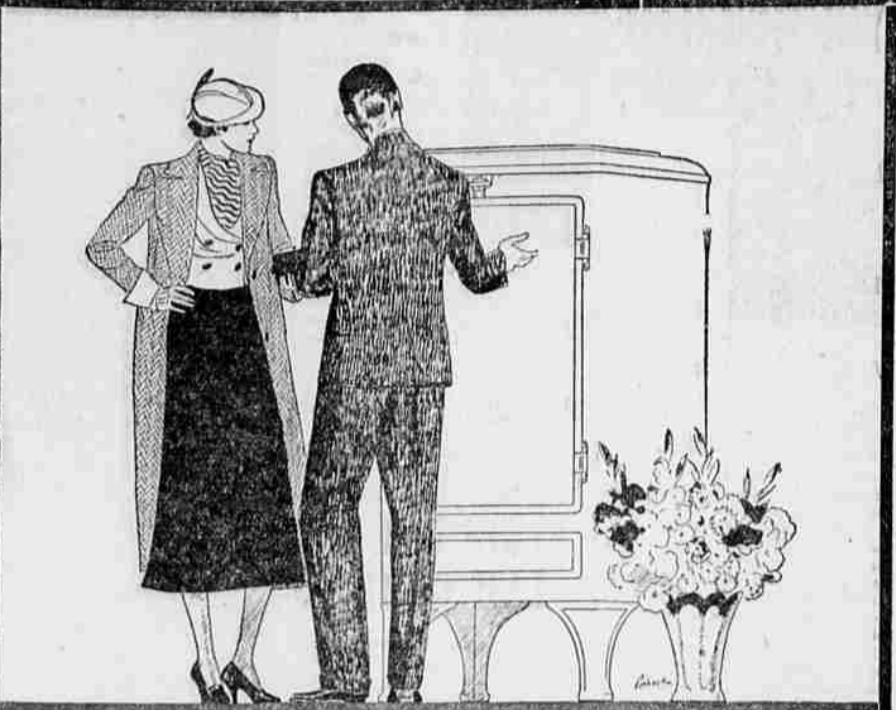
