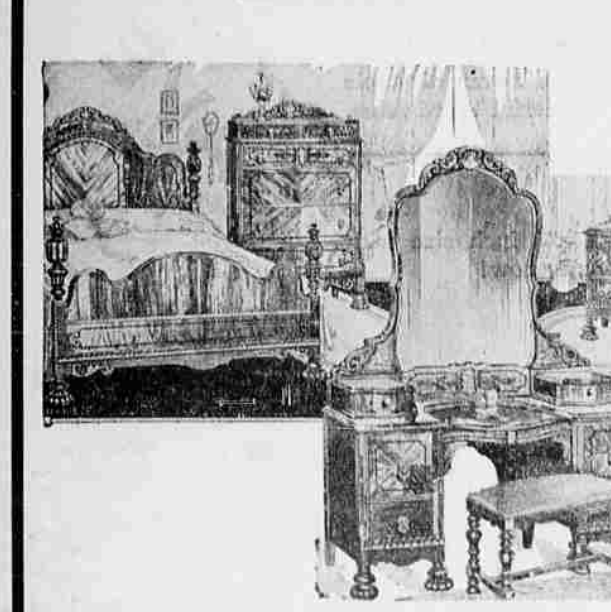
RELIEF FORCES IN ANNEX ROOM
