American Association of University Women La Grande Branch, Entertained Last Eve.; Will Spend Holiday at Kopp Summer Home

Members of the La Grande branch of the American Association of University Women were guests at a very lovely party given last evening at the home of Mrs. Robert S. Eakin, 1812 Walnut street, 45 members of the branch being present, and officers and chairmen of committees acting as hostesses. This party which had been planned to close the year, is an innovation this year, as the luncheon meeting in May, the last of the series of nine, ordinarily is the concluding meeting.

The annual fellowship program, arranged by the chairman, Mrs. Harry G. Avery, and presented by the committee members was the only formal program for the evening. While the A. A. U. W. has a practical and active interest in all community and educational projects, the purpose of its organization was to make possible the carrying on of research in the advance of that which offers the bachelor's and master's degrees. Consequently, it was pointed out, the object of each branch is to see that individually and as a whole it becomes "fellowship-minded." Mrs. Wilbur Zurbrück told of the life of Dr. Margaret Snell, who started the school of home economics at Oregon State college and for whom the fellowship fund of the northwest section, embracing the states of Washington, Oregon, Montana and Idaho, is named. To this fund, the La Grande branch gave \$100 this year. (To the state fellowship fund, of which Miss Margaret Eakin Williams, formerly of Elgin, is the beneficiary next year, the branch gave \$25 in addition to the \$100 set aside to help women students at A. O. N. and a sum to the summer playground project.) Miss Mabel Morton presented the fellowship map, proceeds of the sale of which go to the fellowship fund. Miss Amanda Zabel read letters and described the work and the publications of two women now residing in the northwest, who have benefited from national fellowships in the past.

The remainder of the evening was spent in a delightfully informal fashion, the luncheon meetings usually being so full of business discussions that little opportunity is afforded through the year for social contact. It was during this time that the president, Miss Jean White, presented an invitation from Mrs. Clarence A. Kopp to the branch and members of their families to spend Memorial day at the Kopp's summer home at Ascension park at the Cove, with a day of hiking, horse-back riding, swimming and a big potluck dinner at six o'clock in the evening. The invitation was enthusiastically accepted.

Before the guests left they were invited to the dining room for refreshments. Here as usual about the house were beautiful arrangements of spring flowers—roses, peonies, pansies, snapdragons and many others. Miss Amanda L. McNary Attacks Bill In Senate Debate

speech of the session, replied with a declaration the measure embraced a "sufficiently drastic departure from our tried and tested ways of government to justify stout opposition to this bill."
McNary demanded public hearings for affected industries before rate changes are made under the new measures. He wanted to know how new markets would be found for wheat and wool and said the wool market had been "demoralized by the threat of the bill."
Harrison said he had heard nothing to justify a scare in the wool market and agreed with Republican tariff leaders of the past that wheat prices depended on the world market. He added the bill was aimed at finding new markets for all American surplus products.
Assailing the provision granting only executive hearings to affected industries, McNary declared the uncertainties of the plan would hamper development of American business.

On August 24, 1863 she was united in marriage to Hite Stephenson in Benton, Franklin county, Ill. The following April they started across the plains and arrived in Boise, Idaho in August, 1864. They moved to Walla Walla, Wash., November, 1865, where they made their home until October, 1869. At that time they went to Wallowa where Mr. Stephenson passed away on April 16, 1918.
Mrs. Stephenson moved to La Grande with the family of her daughter in August, 1921 where she remained until her death.
She is survived by four children, John M. Stephenson, of Ely, Nevada, Anna C. McNeese, of La Grande, Minnie L. Johnston, of Portland, and Louise E. Treanor, of Freewater, besides six grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and other relatives and a host of friends.
