Pentecost Will Be Observed In Local Churches

Special Programs Are Included in Group of Services Announced For Next Sunday.

Programs for Sunday services in the churches of La Grande and nearby districts include the following:

First Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)

"Music, once admitted to the soul, becomes a sort of spirit, and never dies. We are happy that we may offer the public as they attend the service of this church at 11:00 o'clock Sunday morning music that lives, under the direction of Mrs. A. L. Richardson, who has again taken over the work of the choir," said Rev. J. G. Walz, adding that she has selected for the anthem number "Light of the World" by Gray, which will be sung by the choir. Another music feature will be the violin solo "A Prelude from the Deluge" by Saint-Saens, played by Charles Mixer, an accomplished violinist, accompanied by Mrs. Mixer. The sermon by the pastor, Mr. Walz, will be the fourth in the series on "The Measure of Man," discussing "His Citizenship in the Kingdom of God."

The Bible school at 9:45 each Sunday morning, brings forth all who attend for the study hour. Classes with a lesson study adapted to all ages, are open to the membership of all who would enroll as also to visitors.

Young people, above high school age meet in the old manse at 8:00 o'clock, where they discuss problems of the day as related to Christian living and the church. At 6:30 those of high school age meet in the parlor of the church and enjoy an interesting program. Miss Mildred Stoddard, Miss Katherine Moran are counselors to these groups. All are welcome to these services.

Riverside Union Sunday School (First and Crook)

Sunday school will begin at 10 o'clock and will be followed by church service at 11 when Rev. P. A. Carpenter will preach. All are welcome to attend these services.

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue)

Next Sunday is Pentecost Sunday, significant to the Christian because of the events which occurred upon Pentecost some 1900 years ago. The word Pentecost is a reference to a Jewish feast which is held fifty days after the Passover feast. In Christian history, however, it is significant of the day upon which the church was founded and the Holy Spirit came into the world. There were 3000 converts on that day in the city of Jerusalem and the Christian church was established in the world. This day will be celebrated at the Central Church of Christ with appropriate services.

An attempt is being made to reach a high attendance in the Bible school at 9:45. An unusual growth has been enjoyed in this school, during the spring months and an attempt is being made to make still further gains leading up to Children's day. There are classes for everyone.

At 11 o'clock the morning worship service will be given to a consideration of the implications of Pentecost. The communion will be observed with a new arrangement of the service adding emphasis to its importance. The choir will sing a special anthem and the pastor will preach the morning sermon.

Christian Endeavor continues to meet at 6:30 p. m. for study and discussion.

The concluding chapters of "The Life of Christ" will be shown upon the screen beginning promptly at 7:30 p. m. These pictures have held great interest for those who have been following them and those who are urged to be in their seats promptly at 7:30. The orchestra will play a short concert at this service. The evening sermon topic will be "The Great Divide." All who will be invited to take advantage of the opportunities this church offers for spiritual improvement.

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Miss Loretta Cook will do the crowning, and Misses Mary Grant and Mary Helen Larson will be her maids of honor.

Every Wednesday at 7 p. m. there will be practice for the senior children's choir of the Catholic church; on Friday at 7 p. m. there will be practice for the junior choir. The St. Vianney Saturday boys will have their weekly meeting every Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

(St. Peter's Church) Episcopal (Fourth and O)

This will be Whit Sunday in the Episcopal church and at the 11 o'clock hour, besides morning prayer and sermon there will be holy communion. Church school is at 9:45 following 8:00 o'clock holy communion. Young people's Fellowship convenes at 6:30 p. m.

Church of the Nazarene

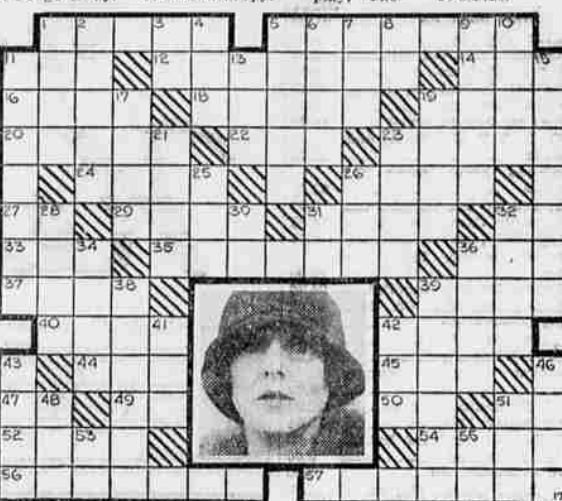
