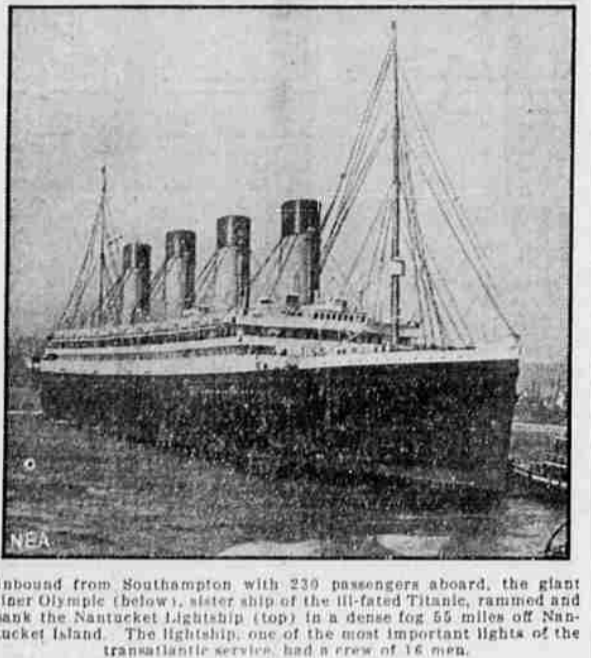


Over The Valley Personals

Lightship and Liner in Crash Off Coast



Inbound from Southampton with 230 passengers aboard, the giant liner Olympic (below), sister ship of the ill-fated Titanic, rammed and sank the Nantucket lightship (top) in a dense fog 55 miles off Nantucket Island. The lightship, one of the most important lights of the transatlantic service, had a crew of 14 men.

(Continued from Page One) The board that the board be abolished at once. It submitted a partial report last night excoriating the NRA. Darrow, the chairman, and another member, advocated government ownership and control of industry. Johnson, NRA administrator, issued a stinging reply to the report and demanded the immediate abolition of the board. Meanwhile, Senator Nye (R., N. D.), whose criticism was largely instrumental in leading to the formation of the board, told reporters the report showed that "many of the codes are working destruction for small business and entrenching monopoly." Senator Borah (R., Idaho), another critic, withheld comment. The board, which had been asked by President Roosevelt to review the practices of the national recovery administration, established at the heart of NRA's principles of industrial codes by saying: "All competition is savage, wolfish and relentless, and can be nothing else. One may as well dream of making war lady-like as of making competition fair." The socialist alternative of government ownership was suggested in a supplementary report signed by Darrow and William O. Thompson of Chicago, former law partner of Darrow. "The choice is between monopoly sustained by government, which is clearly the trend in the national recovery administration, and a planned economy, which demands socialized ownership and control. "The hope of the American people lies in the planned use of America's resources following socialization." One member of the board dissented from the Darrow findings in a minority report. This member, John F. Sinclair, now resigned, denounced the conduct of the majority and labeled its findings as "at times misleading and unreliable." There had been no hint of a supplemental statement such as given out by the Darrow board today. It read in part: "The monopolists and profiteers that were uncovered by the review board's report had their innings today and with their attorneys, paid and unpaid, filled the air with their clamors. The board said here that by investigation it had concluded that monopolistic practices existed in certain industries and that small enterprises were oppressed.
