just prior to the show. These cover all western states and part of Canada. Another invitation went out to that group today and the Engineers' magazine is running a story in June written by C. M. Humphreys relative to the convention and show. This reaches all sections of the United States.

"The Union Pacific system is distributing epitomized program-inventions through its pension checks this month, putting them on the Portland Rose for distribution and placing an allotment in each depot for distribution by ticket sellers between Salt Lake, Spokane and Seattle. The tire covers are being distributed locally today.

"Commencing at once, some member of the Old Timers club, in most cases J. B. McLaughlin, will address service clubs in Eastern Oregon and Washington and parts of Idaho. A striking placard for Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho points will be issued at the proper time, but the color plates are already here. It is a work of art, conceived by Jack Farris of the publicity committee and drawn by Portland artists.

"The housing committee is being called in this week to pave the way for proper housing of both the visiting engineers and the show guests at home coming time.

The details for the Thursday Pioneer meeting were largely rounded out Saturday night. The Union Pacific is furnishing a replica of the first train into La Grande. It will be brought to the station at 9:30 a. m. Thursday carrying a group of pioneers. The welcoming speech impersonating Pat Mahaffey, mayor of La Grande in 1894, will be delivered by a well known pioneer and response will be given by Dunham Wright. Passengers on the train will be properly attired as of the day represented; a parade will follow and the day spent at the park as home-coming and pioneer association celebrations.

"Within a few days we will be ready to announce the details of the other stellar attractions of the show. The day has arrived when all committees must get down to cases and round off and complete their work. It is the policy of the management to hold small group meetings rather than large affairs where matters not at all related are discussed at length with no results.

"The public can in these next two months, be of great assistance by responding to mass effort calls; committees must in all cases bear down from now on. We are going to have the greatest show in our history—also the hardest work."

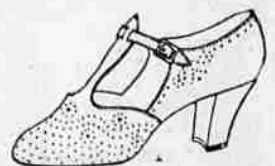
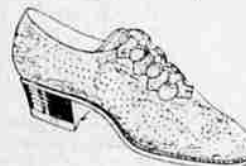
