LAGRANDE TO PAY TRIBUTE TO WAR DEAD

Memorial Day Parade and Services Planned For Wednesday.

LOCAL PATRIOTIC GROUPS TAKE PART

American Legion Takes Lead in Arrangements — Final Committee Meeting Tonight.

La Grande is completing plans this weekend for its annual observance next Wednesday of Memorial day, in honor of those who gave their lives for Old Glory in warlike, with the American Legion post No. 43 taking the lead in preparing for the day's program.

The day's program will begin with a morning parade and Commander Fred Read, of the legion, announces that all ex-service men, whether or not they have uniforms and whether or not they are affiliated with patriotic organizations, are urged to take part in the procession as a special effort is being made to have as large a representation as possible. Comrade Anderson, last G. A. R. member in La Grande, will be specially honored. A car will be provided also for the gold star mothers.

The parade will move, in keeping with annual custom, through downtown La Grande and then to the cemetery, where appropriate services will be held.

At noon, or immediately following the cemetery services, all ex-service men and others in the line of march are invited to a dinner to be served by the women of the auxiliaries of the various patriotic organizations. This will take place in the I. O. O. F. hall.

Organizations participating in the program of the day will include the United Spanish War Veterans and auxiliary, the G. A. R., the Women's Relief Corps, Veterans of Foreign Wars and auxiliary, American Legion and auxiliary, Daughters of the American Revolution, national guard and others.

A committee from the American Legion will hold a meeting this evening to complete arrangements as to details of the program. Members are Victor Eckley, C. J. Shorb and John Garitty, and this committee is being assisted by other legionnaires.

The school election is held each year on the third Monday in June and nominating petitions must be filed with the school clerk at least seven days before election. So far no prospective candidates have announced themselves and School Clerk R. O. Williams, reports no nominating petitions asked for.

The election usually is held in two of the grade school buildings from 2 to 7 p. m.

CHICAGO, May 24 (AP)—His motion to quash the indictments denied, Martin Insull pleaded not guilty today to charges of embezzlement and larceny from his companies and was ordered to trial July 16 before Judge James F. Pardy in criminal court.

LA PAZ, Bolivia, May 24 (AP)—More than 6,000 Paraguayan soldiers were killed and at least 12,000 wounded in a Bolivian counter-attack before Fort Ballivin, according to an official dispatch today.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 24 (AP)—Crushing police squads were warned today to be on the lookout for John Dillinger after the fugitive desperado and three associates were reported seen in Indianapolis riding in a new black sedan with Illinois license plates.

PARIS, May 24 (AP)—France today defeated the United States in a team tennis series between leading women players of the two countries, Ida Adamoff scoring the deciding fourth victory in the seven match series when she defeated the Josephine Crickshank, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3.

NAVY SHOWDOWN EXPECTED-UNCLE SAM PLAYS HAND

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—The United States, Great Britain and Japan were said authoritatively today to be engaged in preliminary conversations concerning the feasibility of holding discussions on naval questions prior to the Washington naval conference next year.

William Phillips, undersecretary of state, declined any official comment on the discussions, but it was understood the first overtures for an exploratory survey of naval questions came from Great Britain and Japan. Japan, through official spokesmen, has announced on numerous occasions that she would demand a revision of the present five-five-five naval ratio established at the London and Washington conferences. Japanese officials also have suggested that a preliminary discussion between the three nations on questions especially pertaining to the Pacific would go a long way toward clearing the atmosphere.

2 Forest Fires Near Bend Now Under Control

BEND, Ore., May 24 (AP)—Approximately 150 acres of forest land was swept by two forest fires which raged through the timber-like Deschutes woods before they were brought within control late yesterday. Crews were kept on the fire line, however, in case of another flare-up. Forest service workers were aided by boys from the Elk Lake CCC camp.

Extreme low humidity gave way to more normal conditions last night when heavy cloud formations moved in from the south. One fire was in the Crane prairie district, and the other near Puzellville, in the Bend sector.

No Copyright On Beards, Judge Decides

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—Beyond peradventure, to take words right out of Federal Judge John M. Woolsey's mouth, there can be no copyright on the growing of beards. "From time immemorial," said the court, "beards have been in the public domain. Any man, if so minded, may not only grow such beard as he can, but may purposely imitate another's facial shrubbery." Judge Woolsey was ruling in the case of the House of David of Benton Harbor, Mich., against Louis Murphy, of Springfield, Ill.

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—Post-shooting between friends and foes of NRA went merrily on today as Clarence Darrow's national review board sought to stymie internal dissension and wind up its work. Darrow and Hugh S. Johnson, opponents in a first-class denunciation match three days ago took a leisurely automobile drive together late yesterday, but about all that could be learned of their conversations was that it dealt with historical topics. A furious attack from organized labor, labeling the Darrow board's report "a disservice to the nation and its citizens in a time of great economic stress," added to the board's troubles as it tackled the preparation of its second report regarding small business and the NRA codes.

BLOODY WAR KILLS 2 IN OHIO STRIKE

Soldiers and Strike Sympathizers in Vicious Fight in Toledo, O.

MORE GUARDSMEN ORDERED TO AREA

Bark of Rifles Follows Hand-to-Hand Scrap After Warning Volley Fails to Cow Crowd.

TOLEDO, O., May 24 (AP)—Two men were known to be dead, a third was reported killed and several were wounded by bullets late today as national guard troops opened fire on strike sympathizers in a third day of rioting at the Electric Auto-Lite factory.

The known dead: Steve Cygon, 29, unemployed youth who had just returned from a CCC camp in California; Frank Hubay, 27, who had lost his job at a battery shop Monday. The firing followed hand-to-hand fighting which took place when a volley of rifle shots fired over the heads of the rioters failed to disperse them.

Col. William L. Marlin, second in command of the troops here, told reporters that no orders to shoot had been given, and expressed the opinion that the soldiers had "lost control." At Columbus, O., Adj. Gen. Frank D. Henderson late today ordered four more companies of national guardsmen into the strike riot area.

As the rioting in earnest began, the crowd of rioters and spectators which grew steadily fell back, the wounded screaming as they fell to the ground. Cries of the injured mingled with curses and shouts of defiance of the rioters.

The troopers had endured the jeers and insults of the crowd since 10 o'clock when a bombardment of tear and "knock-out" gas. "We are on the defensive here," said Col. Marlin. "We intend to preserve order."

Although machine guns were mounted near the scene of the shoot-

NRA POT-SHOOTING GOES MERRILY ON

The Darrow group, already pointed for extinction by President Roosevelt at the end of the month, also suffered an internal explosion which threatened for a time to cause its immediate dissolution. William O. Thompson, a member of the board, accused Lowell Mason, the board's counsel, of tampering with the records. There were remarks about Mason's one-time connection with the famous Truller interests. One thing led to another, resulting in an abrogation of speaking terms among several members of the board. Senator Nye (R., N. D.), a supporter of Darrow, fired another shaft at the NRA. After demanding that congress stay in session until existing "abuses" are corrected, he asserted he intended to take the senate floor daily on this subject.
