## Change Status Of Guard Units Over the Nation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The national guard bureau said orders were being sent to all state national guard units officially changing the setup of the organization to expedite action in time of emergency.

The change, chiefly on paper, became effective as the result of an amendment to the national defense act of last June, which designated the organization of the national guard of the United States.

Under the new setup, the status of officers and men is changed so that in the future they will be inducted into military service as component reserve units and not as individuals.

This is expected to simplify immediate utilization of the national guard in war time.

Under the old system, it was necessary to disband the various guard units, enlist or draft each man again, and organize new units as a part of the army.
