

CATHOLIC CHURCH TO OBSERVE DAY

Memorial day, next Wednesday, May 30, specially set aside to honor the memories of all who died in defense of this country, will be fittingly celebrated in the Church of Our Lady of the Valley by a solemn function during mass at 8 o'clock in the

morning. It was announced today by Rev. Dr. Brady, pastor of the church, who will conduct the service and memorialize the dead in an address. The reverend pastor is a volunteer chaplain of the World War, and during that great conflict was an official of the United States and also the state of Oregon.

NO SNOW NOW IN THE BEAVER CREEK DISTRICT

Recently City Manager Angus McAllister spent several days going over the Beaver creek watershed, inspecting conditions at the reservoir, etc. He found no snow in the watershed although the springs are furnishing a good flow of water, and the reservoir is full. At one place in the hills where a ranger told him there usually is from three to four feet of snow early in June, this year all the snow had gone a month ago.

SHOWERS DUE, PREDICTION OF WEATHER MAN

Although some sections of North-eastern Oregon were treated to heavy showers yesterday and last night, no precipitation of measurable quantity fell in La Grande. The sky was partly cloudy this morning with the weather man predicting showers to-night or Friday and cooler weather tomorrow.

60 SENIORS TO CONTINUE SCHOOL WORK

College work at the Normal school, 22 of them planning to enroll next year. Fifteen announced their intentions of going to business college, some of them intending to enroll here, one in the Quincy Business college in Illinois, one in the Walla Walla Business college, one in a Hollywood business college and several merely wrote "business college." Eight put down either "P. G." work or "school." Four intend to go to Oregon State college, one to Whitman college, one to Stanford university and one to nurses' school.

Of the 128 students, 49 had no immediate plans for next year or else were "undecided." Some of these may go to higher institutions if the opportunity is present. Thirteen plan to work next year, and of these, two had definite employment awaiting them and two more apparently had prospects for stenographic work.
