

SAFeway STORES CELEBRATE WITH "BIRTHDAY SALE"

All stores of the Safeway system in the Pacific northwest will jointly celebrate the 19th anniversary of the founding of the stores with a four-day sale, starting Friday, May 25. This is the first "Birthday Sale" the Safeway stores have ever held, and will commemorate the service and

growth of an idea conceived by M. B. Skaggs, who put it into effect at American Falls, Idaho, 19 years ago this month.

Mr. Skaggs was at that time 27 years of age and a new arrival from the east. With a few hundred dollars he borrowed, he built without assistance his initial store on the edge of the desert town, surrounded by sagebrush and sand. He was his own architect and carpenter, floor layer and painter. His next move was to purchase a stock of supplies, the best brands obtainable, which were marketed at a narrow margin of profit. Two years later he opened his second store at Burley, Idaho, and

14 months thereafter his third store was opened at Blackfoot, Idaho. Today Mr. Skaggs is chairman of the board of directors of an organization operating in 21 western states. The first store in Oregon was opened in Portland in 1921.

Mr. Skaggs had determined upon opening his first store to buy what was possible in the same vicinity where it was sold, and his stores have always followed that policy. In each district where a Safeway store is located the bulk of fresh produce is purchased from local gardens. Thousands of dollars are spent in this district each year by the Safeway system.

The same men who helped to build the Safeway organization are still at

the helm. Only five of the 325 executives have not at one time worked behind the counter of one of the Safeway stores. The manager of every store in this region has given his part in the birthday sale by conferring with the district manager, the ideas of all Safeway employees being incorporated into the general plan under which the sale will be conducted.

Junior Colleges Of Coach Rich In Cinder 'Phenoms'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The balance of track and field power among California's leading teams—Stanford, Southern California, California and UCLA — may hinge next season on a host of great junior college stars.

Under the transfer rule of the Pacific Coast conference, junior college athletes are eligible for competition in their first year of enrollment, and it is considered more than likely that a goodly share of them will find their way into California's "big four" next fall.

An indication of the potentialities of these performers may be seen in some of the marks made in the Southern California junior college meet.

Morris Pollock of Riverside J. C. won three events — the hundred in 9.5, the four hundred in 2:11 and the broad jump at 24 feet 7 3/4 inches — a nice prize for some college coach!

Then there was Bill Brown, who ran the high hurdles in 14.7 seconds and the low in 24 seconds flat, not to mention Cornelius Johnson, Olympic games high jumper, who leaped 6 feet 6 inches.

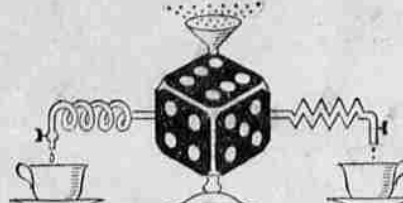
