"Motorcade" To Arrive At M. E. Church Tomorrow

Missionary Officials Coming Here—Church Programs For Sunday Are Announced.

Services in the La Grande churches next Sunday include the following: First Methodist Episcopal Church (Spring Avenue and Fourth St.) The weekend will bring to this church a group of speakers representing the missionary interests of the church. The "Motorcade," a group of national and branch workers in the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, will arrive in La Grande early Saturday morning for a program beginning at 10 a. m. The pastor will conduct a brief devotional service followed by the visiting speakers. Devotions are expected from Methodist churches at Baker, Cove, Union, North Powder, Island City, Wallawa, Enterprise and Joseph. The public is invited to these services which will last until about 3 o'clock.

At the morning worship service on Sunday, the theme will be in keeping with Memorial day observance. The pastor speaking on the subject "Bought With a Price." Besides the anthem, Mrs. Thomas McGuire will sing a contralto solo.

Sunday school is at 9:45 and Epworth League at 6:30 o'clock.

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) "Going to church is the real spice of what would be otherwise prosaic and dull in the stir and hubbub of the world. Called into action by a new emergency in these days of depression, crime and unsettled international conditions, the church must enter upon her new task of bringing about new conditions for peace and prosperity, with tremendous earnestness," said Rev. J. George Wark in his call to worship at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. He continues, "Firmness and strength underlying our claim for our rights, urges us to challenge all men and women to the task to go to church, it is humanity's greatest inspiration." The minister will speak on "The Glories of Civilization." The choir, Mrs. A. L. Richardson, directing, will sing the anthem "Rejoice, the Lord is King" by Shackley, and Mrs. J. W. Leonard, soprano, will sing "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" by Ambrose.

Harold Pinlay, superintendent, with his officers and teachers, is offering class work in the study of the Bible, to all ages.

Miss Hulda Anderson and other counselors and workers, are preparing for each Sunday afternoon at five o'clock and six-thirty, programs fitting the deep questioning of youth for the best way to live the bigger life. At five all above high school age are welcome, at six-thirty all of high school age.

Riverside Union Sunday School (First and Crook Streets) Sunday school begins at 10 o'clock. Testaments are being presented to those in the junior classes who memorize the names of the books of the New Testament.

At 11 o'clock Sunday morning George E. Scott will speak. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to attend these services.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington) Service is held at 11 a. m. Sunday following Sunday school at 9:45 o'clock. Wednesday evening meetings begin at 8 p. m. The reading room in the West-Jackson building is open from 1:30 to 5 p. m. daily.

The subject of the Sunday service will be "Soul and Body." The golden text is, "The very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thess. 5:23).

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-lesson are the following from the Bible: "Beloved, now are we the sons of God" (1 John 3:2). The lesson-lesson also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Jesus beheld in Science the perfect man, who appeared to him where, sinning mortal man appears to mortals. In this perfect man the Saviour saw God's own likeness, and this correct view of man healed the sick. Thus

Jesus taught that the Kingdom of God is intact, universal, and that man is pure and holy" (p. 478).

Church of Our Lady of the Valley (Rev. Thomas J. P. Brady, A. M., Ph. D., pastor) Masses in the church will be at 6 and at 8 o'clock in the morning with confession before each. The feast of the day is the Blessed Trinity. The pastor will conduct the services at both masses and preach. With next Sunday the Easter time comes to a close.

Confessions will be heard on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock and at 7, during one hour.

Next Friday evening at 7 all children connected with the May queen ceremony will rehearse for the crowning of the Blessed Virgin Mary as Queen of May. Miss Loretta Cook will be the May queen, and have for maids of honor, the Misses Mary Grant and Mary Ann Larson. The crowning will take place next Sunday evening at 7 o'clock at 7:30. On next Saturday morning at 9 o'clock there will be another practice rehearsal. The ceremony will close with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O) Holy communion at 8 a. m. is followed by church school at 9:45. Morning prayer with sermon begins at 11 o'clock. The Boy Scouts, with their leader, Harvey Carter, and the Explorers' Club, two organizations which St. Peter's church has been sponsoring for the last two years, will attend the morning service in a body. Parents of the boys also are invited.

The Young People's Fellowship meeting begins at 6:30 p. m.

Central Church of Christ (Depue Avenue) Special observance of Memorial day will be made at the Central Church of Christ Sunday. The Woman's Relief Corps organization will be special guests at the morning service at 11 o'clock at which time the pastor, Rev. Paul DeP. Mortimer, will preach a Memorial day sermon. There will be special music by the choir appropriate to the occasion. The communion will be a part of the morning service.

Bible school meets at 9:45 a. m. and offers instruction in the Bible for all who care to attend. There are closely graded classes for every age.

The young people meet for discussion and study at 7:30 p. m. Sunday evening. There are two groups of Christian Endeavorers meeting at this hour.

The hour of the evening service has been set for eight o'clock Sunday evening and the service will begin with a prelude by the Christian orchestra. Those who enjoy "living music" will appreciate this service in which a number of the musicians of the city participate. A lively song service is participated in by the entire congregation. The subject of the evening sermon will be "In the Beginning." A special invitation is issued to students of the Eastern Oregon Normal school to hear this sermon. The pastor states that some of the greatest scientists of the present day have expressed new opinions on the subject of origins which will be cited in this sermon. The public is most cordially invited to all services of this church.

Baptist Church (Sixth and Spring) At the Baptist church Sunday morning, the pastor will use as his subject "Does Crime Pay?" The choir will sing an anthem.

There will be no evening preaching service on account of the bacchalaureate service for the high school. The subject of the young people's discussion is "The Every Day Use and Abuse of Money."

Hours of services are: Bible school, 9:45; morning worship, 11:00; young people's meeting, 7:00; Thursday evening prayer meeting, 6:00.

Salvation Army (211 Fir Street) "All men are born equal and they begin to grow out of it. To grow in the right direction you should attend some place of worship," said Capt. Daniel Redy in announcing the week-end services. The captain's subject for Saturday at the free and easy meeting at 8 p. m. will be "What Think Ye of Christ?"

Sunday school will be at 10 a. m. with sound Bible teaching and classes for all ages. The Y. P. Legion meets at 6:30 p. m. the lesson to be taken from 1 Samuel 9:14-27. The corps will unite with the churches for the bac-

calure service at the L. D. S. tabernacle and there will be no Salvation Army service at 8 p. m. Sunday.

Weeknight services include Thursday, prayer and Bible study; Thursday, young people; Saturday, free and easy.

All are welcome to attend.

M. E. Church South (Corner U and Fir) Sunday school is at 10 o'clock sharp and if all are present and on time, a good school is assured. W. B. Starmer is superintendent. Preaching at the 11 o'clock hour will be by the pastor, Rev. A. J. Starmer. His subject will be "Eternal Satisfaction as Taught in the Bible," a Methodist doctrine.

There will be no services in the evening because of the bacchalaureate services. The church's fourth quarterly conference will be held June 24 instead of July 1.

THE LAST JUDGMENT Mat. 25: 31 - 46

Quick Spinach ONE of the reasons why Mother won't eat his spinach, is that it has taken so much time to prepare. Even if she has a special little hose for washing it, minutes and morale are needed to do a good job of getting rid of all the sand. Mothers who know about food values and believe in saving time and temper often use canned spinach which is cleaned on a grand scale while it is still dewy, and is ready to use, giving Mother some extra minutes to prepare it in ways that even the most anti-spinach child will find hard to resist. For instance:

Tomatoes Stuffed with Spinach: Drain half a can of spinach (about one cup), add one tablespoon lemon juice and salt and pepper to taste. Have small ripe tomatoes peeled and scooped out into cups and well chilled. Sprinkle the inside of the cup with salt and stuff with spinach. Chill until ready to use.

Carrots in Spinach Nests: Boil until tender two cups new diced carrots and one green pepper, diced. Drain and add to a cup and a half white sauce. Heat the contents of one No. 2½ can spinach thoroughly, and pile in individual mounds on hot platter. Make a depression in each mound and fill with creamed vegetables. Garnish with bacon curls and crisp celery.

For Older Children Spinach and Bacon au Gratin: Dice two slices bacon and fry them brown. Add the contents of one No. 2½ can of spinach well seasoned with an eighth of a teaspoon pepper, one teaspoon salt, a few grains nutmeg, an eighth of a teaspoon of paprika, and half a teaspoon chopped onion. Add one beaten egg yolk, and pile in a buttered baking dish. Cover with buttered crumbs and sprinkle one tablespoon grated cheese over the top. Bake in hot oven—400 degrees—for fifteen or twenty minutes. This serves four to six.

Spinach served on rounds of toast which have been spread with deviled ham also appeals to young palates—and old ones, too.
