assisted by using a screwdriver and wood chisel which he had probably received from the outside. He had then gained his freedom by sliding down the drain pipe from the court room and was discovered to be missing a short time later.

After watching most of the day on the highway from Enterprise, searching the branch line train at Elgin as it came through and generally prohibiting the escape from this end, Sheriff Brewsters was informed again by Sheriff Miller that the prisoner had been found late in the day hiding under some weeds and wire about 100 yards from the court house, apparently waiting for darkness to complete his escape.
