Tomorrow, Memorial day, the La Grande club will take on the strong Illini Emigrants, C.C.C. nine which defeated the La Graders here recently 8 to 4. This time Winnie Casmann, E.O.S. pitcher, will face the Emigrants. Against Baker next Sunday Courtney and Cammann will be ready for mound duty with Ira Wode slated to be in the receiving role. The Emigrant team is made up partly of players who were outstanding in several fast leagues in Illinois last year, and plays a fast brand of ball. The game will begin at 2 p. m. tomorrow at the high school athletic field.

ROSS WINNER OF NEW RING TITLE

NEW YORK, May 29 (AP) — Black-haired, flashing-eyed Barney Ross, sensational Jewish fighter born on New York's teeming east side but reared to ring greatness as a product of Chicago's west side ghetto, stood out today as a double champion on a pinnacle never before scaled in boxing history. The 25-year-old Chicago youth, with a speed that was as dazzling as the courage with which he stugged to the toe with his hard-hitting rival, thrilled a vast crowd in Madison Square Garden bowl, Long Island, last night by battering Jimmy McLarnin to defeat in 15 stirring rounds and thereby added the world's welterweight championship to the lightweight title he has held for a year.

18 of 26 games played and amassed a total of 226 points. Their opponents scored 505 points. Five members of the 1934 track team qualified for the state meet but only Orval McCormack placed. McCormack ran second to Hunter, of Chemawa, who set a new state record in the high hurdles. The Pendleton runner himself equalled the former state record of 15.9 seconds.

Bucks Point To Year of Success In E. O. Sports

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special) — Winner of two district championships and runner-up for a third, the Pendleton high school athletic teams have just concluded one of the most successful years in the school's athletic history. The Buckaroos won the basketball title of District 3 and captured Eastern Oregon track honors by winning first in the district 1 meet. The 1933 football squad, "rated the most successful to represent the school since 1924, placed second to La Grande for gridiron honors last fall.

Pacific Baseball Team Wins Title

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 29 — Coach Anne Cornell and his Pacific university Badgers Saturday became northwest conference baseball champions for 1934 by virtue of a 7 to 4 trimming handed Whitman at the local stadium in the third and decisive game of the playoff series. Voters May Mark 18 Measures On General Ballot

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — July 5 will be the closing date for the filing of completed petitions for 18 initiative proposals for which ballot titles have been prepared. If they are to appear on the November ballot, Secretary of state P. J. Stadelman announced. Eight of those measures for which ballot titles have already been prepared are concerned with repeal or modification of the Knox liquor law, and still another request for a ballot title for a similar measure is pending.

Three petitions propose measures to limit taxation on homes, and one would restrict interest rates on personal loans to not more than 12 percent per year. Another measure seeks to put on the ballot a constitutional amendment to authorize the establishment of a state bank and a measure to provide the machinery for the operation of such a bank.
