The fire fighting equipment of the town of Wallowa was taxed to capacity, but in spite of efforts to keep the fire from spreading, a house next to the hotel was burned and the flames also jumped across the road and destroyed an old livery stable. Two other residences caught fire from the sparks flying, but these fires were extinguished before any damage was done.

The Miller hotel, the last available place in Wallowa for accommodating the public has been managed for the last four years by Miss Frankie Allen and her mother, Glen Allen. It is a landmark of the town, being one of the oldest buildings there.

Those who were being housed in the hotel were accommodated last night in the old Cameron house where they will remain for the present. Whether or not the hotel will be rebuilt is unknown.

Body, we believe that the funds entrusted to the organization will be used for the glory of our Lord and for the best good of the needy with whom they make contact." Capt. Stacy's report showed a total of 1,569 persons helped from Jan. 1 to May 26 this year, at a total cost of \$510. Meals were given 737 transient men, 195 transient families and 137 transient women, a total of meals to 1,074 transient groups. Beds were given 19 transient men, 72 transient families, and 14 transient women, a total of 705 garments were furnished 83 persons, shoes went to 40, groceries and clothing orders were given to 48 families and 246 persons in families were helped, totaling \$22 in this division, or a grand total of 1566 persons helped.

The \$510 was divided as follows: value of food to families \$155.00, value of clothing and shoes \$21.00, value of meals \$269.75, value of beds \$26.25, medical aid \$38.00.
