PENDLETON WILL HOLD CELEBRATION

PENDLETON, Ore., May 31 (Special).—Pendleton, which for a quarter of a century has entertained the world at its annual Round-Up is issuing invitation for the dedication of its new airport and the celebration of the first airmail flight on Saturday, June 2.

A parade with bands, Indians, Indian princesses, pennant bearers, pony express riders, cowboys, cowgirls and stagecoaches, all remnants of Pendleton's far-famed Westward-100, will start the celebration at 1:00 p. m. and will wind through Pendleton streets while airplanes fly overhead. At 2:30 p. m. the airport program will begin with the arrival of a stagecoach, bringing the first flight mail, and followed by a pony express rider who will dash to the airport with a special letter to President Roosevelt, inviting him to the 1934 show, September 13, 14 and 15.

The official dedication of the airport will be by six Indian princesses, in their ceremonial costumes of snowy buckskins and beads.
