AMERICAN FILMS TRIPLE ENGLAND'S HOME OUTPUT

LONDON (AP) — Nearly three times as much American movie film as British was registered here last year. Dr. Edward Burgin, of the board of trade, told the commons that registrations of British films amounted to 1,202,197 feet, including 69,777 feet made overseas in the British empire. Films of United States origin totaled 3,568,426 feet while other foreign films totaled 190,967 feet.

MUSSOLINI CLOSING AIR GAP IN TRAVEL TO NEAR EAST

ROME (AP)—Arrangements for covering a "blind spot" in Europe's air communications with Asia Minor, Africa and India have been approved by Premier Mussolini.

The plan involves running a special night train from Rome to the Adriatic air terminal at Brindisi. Planes which now have to stop overnight at Athens, under the new arrangements will make Istanbul and Egypt before nightfall.

EUGENE, Ore., June 2 (AP)—With the outcome as unsettled as the weather, track and field stars prepared to battle for titles and new records in the northern division conference track and field meet here today.

Washington State still ruled as the favorite to win the meet, but the threats of University of Washington and University of Oregon loomed larger in the light of the outcome of qualifying heats in the hurdles and the two dashes yesterday.

The well-balanced Washington team captured two of the six places in each of the four events where entrants were thinned by heats. Poul weather caused abandonment of heats in the field events. Oregon placed six men in the four preliminary events yesterday. Washington State and Montana three each, and Oregon State and Idaho two each.

and all-time heat records made the nation's weather map a crazy quilt today.

While snowstorms ushered in the month of June in Montana, Washington and Idaho, Milwaukee sweltered under a record high of 103 degrees, and Chicago experienced the second hottest day in its history—102.2 degrees.

Forest fires broke out in the parched areas of New York, Maine and Wisconsin, while in the southwest scattered rains brought relief from the heat to some communities. A high wind swept through a drought-stricken section near Pender, Neb., causing considerable damage.

A light rain brought some relief to St. Louis; a half a dozen cities in the Texas Panhandle reported rainfall, some of which measured more than three-fourths of an inch, and rain and hail preceded a snowstorm at Butte, Montana.

CHICAGO, June 2 (AP)—A shifting wind which drove thermometers down 13 degrees in 17 minutes brought heat relief to Chicagoans early today—but the record breaking heat caused 13 deaths in the city in two days.

WINNIPEG, June 2 (AP)—Farmers of Western Canada looked out over rain-soaked fields today as moisture laden clouds broke a 13-day drought and poured a million-dollar rainfall over sun-baked grain shoals.

The precipitation extended clear across the southern wheat belt from Manitoba to the western Alberta border line.
