MEDFORD, Ore., June 4 (AP) — The coronation of Anne Whitaker of Eugene, daughter of Oregon's first governor, as pioneer queen mother, is the main event scheduled for the second day of the diamond jubilee, commemorating 75 years of Oregon statehood. Pomp and pageantry will attend the ceremony, which will be held tonight.

WAR, WEALTH, CRIME THREE BIG PROBLEMS

three problems, the solution of which would be necessary for the dawn of this new day, which he insisted was before us. The first was the problem of war. "War does not settle problems," he argued, "for every problem at the beginning of a war has ten problems to match it when the war is over. The new day will not be worthy the name of a new day unless it is made an age when nation shall not lift up sword against nation any more."

Second he stressed the problem of the unequal distribution of wealth and that problem will never be solved, he believed, until a generation is taught how to use wealth and how to save it. So long as producers in wheat sections must burn their wheat for fuel because its price is so low in comparison with the high price of other fuel which must be purchased, while hundreds of thousands in other sections are starving for the products of this same wheat, the problem will not be solved.

The rising generation must find some solution for the crime problem and this, he stated, would never be found until the schools, the churches, the service clubs become sufficiently concerned about the crime problem, that they will go out for the underprivileged child and give him the physical, medical, spiritual and social aid he needs.

These problems, he asserted, were tremendous but they head for a new day. Likewise, the period through which we have been passing prefigures a better day.

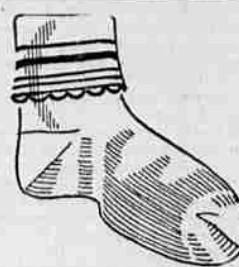
