Price of Refined Sugar Goes Higher

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—The price of refined sugar, as quoted by leading refiners, was raised today slightly more than 1/2 cent a pound to 4.65 cents, less the usual trade discounts. The advance, which is to absorb the processing tax of 3 1/4 cents per hundred pounds, will become effective at the opening of the market Friday. Some refiners in other centers announced similar increases yesterday.
