need of attention, federal funds will be allotted for medical attention to needy families, Dr. Murphy said.

Taking La Grande as an average community, the condition disclosed here would prove some aid of such nature urgently required, the doctor said. Better than 90 per cent of the children in the La Grande school were revealed by the local survey to need dental care. Eighty-five per cent were reported in need of considerable dentistry and over 20 per cent of the children examined showed the very serious condition of mal-formed jaws.
