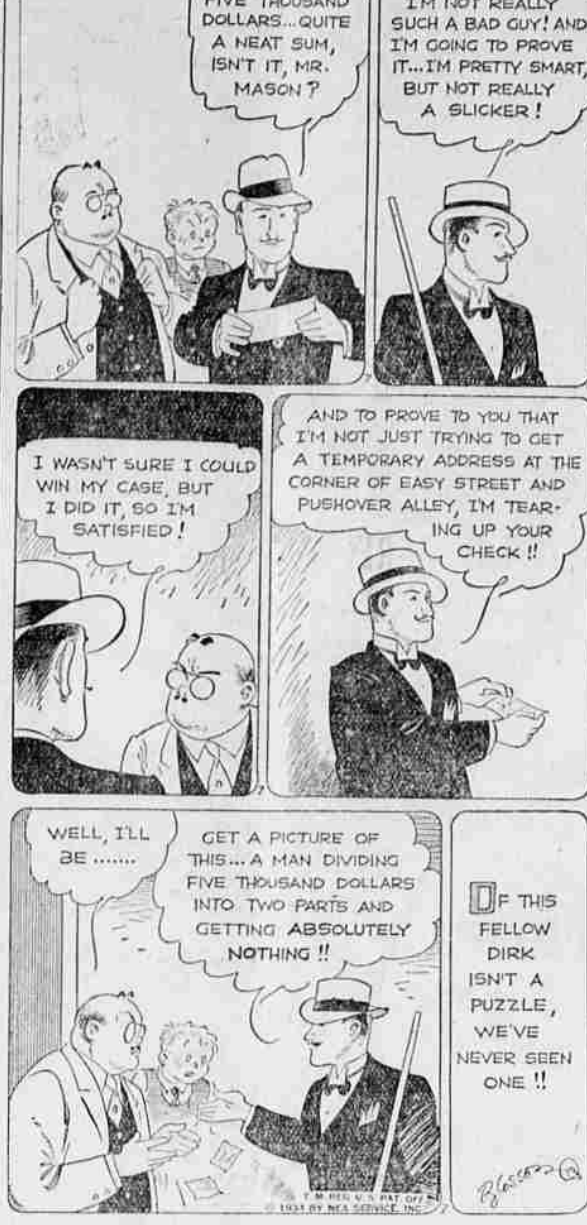
**End Visit—**

itive cutting while reducing to a minimum opportunities for artificial maintenance of high prices, and similar developments which have caused complaint.

The arrangement will permit open provisions in codes where desired by an industry, but on the condition that prices be reported to a confidential, disinterested agency for distribution to all members of the industry and customers willing to pay for the service.

Such posted price may not be revised upward within 48 hours but may be reduced without time limit.

The prices posted will represent actual transactions or offers and there will be no waiting period during which competitors may make arrangement for a uniform price.
